Emerson Merrick, auto camp proprietor told the Lion club this noon, in an interesting talk on "Tourist Traffic in Medford."

Mr. Merrick gave specific examples of prospective new residents in the city who, after becoming the near victims of high-powered salesmanship left the city without giving it a fair chance to prove itself.

The auto camp proprietor must be a veritable information bureau, according to Mr. Merrick. He must be able to respond to questions about the conditions of business, the climate, the amount of rainfall per year, the number and location of schools, churches and all other points of interest throughout the country.
