### MEDFORD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE MODEL

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A model municipal traffic ordinance worked out by the national conference on street and highway safety now is in operation in 14 cities in the United States and one in Canada.

Cities which have adopted the ordinance are Indianapolis, Grand Rapids, Mich.; Providence, R. I.; Roanoke, Va.; Findlay, O.; Port Dodge, Ia.; Great Falls, Mont.; Louisville; Boston; Hinton, W. Va.; Savannah, Ga.; Medford, Ore., and Hamilton, Ont.

Los Angeles, San Francisco and Chicago have passed ordinances similar to it.

Portions of the ordinances have been incorporated in the traffic codes of numerous other cities, and a law enacted in New Jersey, containing most of the provisions of the model ordinance, is effective in all New Jersey cities and towns.

### BEACONS LIGHT NORTH AIRWAY

Five air mail beacons, located north of this city, are now in operation and six beacons located south of this city, and in northern California, are ready for operation, department of commerce, aviation branch, announced today.

Work was recently completed on the distribution of air mail beacons for the 60 sites, between Redding, Calif., and Portland, Oregon.

Towers for 10 beacons, located on the Delta-Drain unit, have been installed.

Each of the beacons is of 2,000,000 candle-power, and tests were conducted last week, for same.

Work on the installing of the beacons, is being rushed to complete the task in the mountainous areas before winter sets in.
