## SLAYER OF SON-IN-LAW TO TESTIFY

Eighteen-Year-Old Widow Will Aid Father Who Killed Young Husband—Dingy Courtroom Is Stage in Drama—Testimony of Principals to Break Long Silence.

WEATHERFORD, Texas, Oct. 31.—(AP)—On the dingy stage of a worn courtroom room, with crimson-stained windows furnishing a theatrical illumination, there probably will be enacted today the drama of an 18-year-old widow fighting to save from a death penalty the father who killed her youthful husband.

Principals in this thriller of real life are R. H. Hamilton, wealthy former judge of the supreme court of appeals, university professor, churchman—and admitted believer in summary justice—and his widowed daughter, Theresa.

Judge Hamilton—he is known as the "Judge" up and down all Texas—is accused of fatally shooting his son-in-law, Tom Walton, Jr., when the youth went to the barrister's office to tell him of his secret marriage to Theresa. The young couple were students in the University of Texas at the time of their marriage.

Witnesses have testified that Judge Hamilton exclaimed immediately after the boy fell, with five shots through his chest, "I would rather be killed myself than kill a man, except to save my family."

The state unexpectedly rested its case yesterday, with 20 witnesses uncalled. Testimony had been introduced that the youthful husband was sent to Hamilton's office by his mother, who was sure that "the judge will understand" that shots were heard a minute after he had walked through the lawyer's office door, and that he was found on the floor, already dead, with Judge Hamilton standing across the room.

Today Judge Hamilton himself probably will take the stand. He, his daughter and other members of his family have maintained silence since the shooting and what the judge will have to say on the stand is known only to his legal staff. After him will appear Theresa, who has been barred from the courtroom because of her status as a witness.

Her time yesterday was spent playing bridge in the hotel of which her father has reserved the entire top floor.

## LOBBYIST SAYS TEXAS SENATOR DUE FOR DEFEAT

President Southern Tariff Assn. Testifies Garner's Attitude On Fiscal Legislation Should Bring About Retirement.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—(AP)—John Henry Kirby, president of the Southern Tariff association, testified before the senate lobby committee today he thought Representative Garner of Texas, the house Democratic leader, should be defeated for congress because of his attitude toward fiscal legislation.

Chairman Caraway asked the witness if he knew that J. A. Arnold, secretary of the association, and R. B. Cressler, Republican national committeeman from Texas, sought to have C. C. Belcher, who was not identified further, run against Garner.

"No, I don't believe that," replied Kirby.

The chairman then said Cressler had written Arnold that he believed Belcher could make things "hot" for Garner and was "sorry" we could not get Belcher into this district.

Kirby said he knew nothing about this.

"Does it come as a surprise to you to know that Arnold has attempted to join an alliance with the Republicans to defeat Democrats," Caraway asked.

"I think some of them ought to be defeated," he said, "on account of their tariff views."

Kirby then named Garner as one he thought should be beaten.

Caraway asked if Arnold's duty in Washington was to see members of congress and to try to "fix up" legislation.

"I think some one ought to present my views," he answered, adding that he approved Senator Bingham's action in employing Charles L. Exanson to aid him in tariff matters.

## REPORTERS GO TO CELLS FOR HIDING NAMES

Capital Court Declares Questions of Grand Jury Were Proper—News Ethics Not Proper Ground for Immunity.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—(AP)—Three reporters for the Washington Times, afternoon newspaper, were today sentenced to 45 days each in jail by Judge Peyton Gordon on the District of Columbia supreme court for refusing to reveal to the grand jury the names and addresses of persons from whom they claimed to have purchased liquor.

In passing sentence for contempt of court, Judge Gordon told the reporters, Burket, 30 and Jack E. Nevin, Jr., 24, that the questions asked them by the grand jury were entirely proper. The law, he said, did not recognize the ethics of the newspaper profession as sufficient grounds for a plea for immunity.

The men told the court they had bought liquor in 49 speakeasies in Washington. They explained they had gained admittance through friends and that they had promised not to reveal the names of the bootleggers, asserting their only purpose in going to the speakeasies was to develop news stories relating to "crime conditions" in Washington.

Hendricks testified that to comply with the jury's request would bring him and the other two reporters into disrepute and that the violation of the ethics of newspaper profession would cause them to lose their positions.

## GUARANTEE FOR TURKEY POOL IS PLACED IN BANK

Thirty Thousand Posted By New York Firm for Co-op. Birds—Cash Advance Price Rates Are Stipulated For Receipts.

Savage & Company of New York City today deposited in the Jackson County bank and in the Josephine County bank at Grants Pass the sum of \$30,000 in each institution as a trust and guarantee fund for the Rogue River Valley turkey pool, conducted by the Farmers Exchange Co-operative, Clay D. Parker, manager.

Cash advances will be paid for turkeys upon receipt at the following prices: No. 1 young toms, old hens and young hens, 32 cents per pound; old toms, 25 cents; No. 2 turkeys, 22 cents.

Killing of turkeys for the pool will start next Monday, November 4, and they will be received at the Farm Exchange Co-operative on Tuesday, November 5. It is expected that the first carload of valley turkeys will be shipped Wednesday, November 9. The shipments next week will be by freight. Any shipment after that date will be by express.

The local turkey shipments will arrive at the New York market the Saturday before Thanksgiving, considered an ideal time.

The pool embraces the Medford, Ashland and Grants Pass districts and, according to Charles F. Lucas, of Savage & Company, close to 25,000 turkeys will be entered in the pool. Pledges for the furnishing of between 6000 and 7000 pounds of turkeys have been filed with the Farm Exchange Co-operative to date.

## APPORTION COUNTY ROAD FUND SHARE

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 31.—(AP)—Before the state highway commission projects advertised on six highways for the next meeting December 12. They are the Oregon coast highway, central Oregon, Mitchell-Dayville, Santiam, McKenzie and Old Oregon Trail.

The commission announced that when it meets in January bids would be received from the bridge across the Rogue river at Gold Beach and Wedderburn. The bridge department assured the commission the bridge will be constructed within two years.

Distribution of market funds for the last half of 1929 was made by the commission as follows: Baker, \$15,819.29; Douglas, \$21,676.11; Josephine, \$22,443.62; Jackson, \$21,294.64; Lane, \$26,697.64; Marion, \$24,805.24.

## NEED OF EAST WEST LINE FOR OREGON SHOWN

Extension Westward to Crane for Connection With S. P. Near Crescent Lake Advocated Before Commission By Oregon.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 31.—(AP)—The contention that northwestern railroads should be required to build an extension westward from Crane, Ore., to a connection with the Southern Pacific near Crescent lake, was laid before the interstate commerce commission here in a meeting yesterday by the Oregon public service commission. The interstate commerce commission took the matter under consideration. It now has before it, in addition to pleas of opposing attorneys, a report of Commissioner Frank McNamany, sitting as examiner recommending that construction be ordered.

Counsel for the railroads opposed the 185-mile project on the ground that necessities of the region do not justify the expenditure. It was estimated the east-west line would cost \$9,000,000.

The defendant railroads include the Southern Pacific, Central Pacific, Union Pacific, Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Co., and the Oregon Short Line. Counsel for these lines contend the interstate commerce commission, without jurisdiction to order construction.

Development hampered. The Oregon public service commission held that development of Central and Western Oregon is being hampered by the absence of an east-west cross-state line.

Counsel for the complainants declared traffic now originating in western Oregon and destined to eastern points must move either south to Roseville, Calif., or north to Portland. A similar movement, they contended, is experienced on traffic originating in eastern Oregon and southwestern Idaho and destined to California and southwestern Oregon.

As a result, it was said, a longer haul is made and greater time consumed, making it impossible to ship certain perishable products.

## MONTCREST RANCH IS BUYER PRIZE STEER

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 31.—(AP) Hercules Gift, son of champion shorthorn calf at the Pacific International Livestock exposition was sold at auction today for \$561, the proceeds to be added to the Duncan Dunn scholarship fund at the Washington State college, which raised the animal, after he had been donated by F. M. Rothrock, Sprague, Wash.

Montcrest ranch of Hill, Cal., paid 23 cents a pound for the champion Hereford steer owned by the Oregon State college.

## ACUTE INDIGESTION IS FATAL TO TINY BABY

Acute indigestion was given today by Coroner W. H. Conger as the cause of the death of the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Wilkinson at the Riverside apartments Wednesday. There had been some question as to the cause of the baby's demise and an inquest had been considered.

Mrs. Wilkinson had cared for

the baby and placed it in the crib about 10 a. m. About 12 o'clock when she went to the child, she was unable to awaken him and sent for her husband, who immediately summoned a physician who, upon arrival, pronounced the baby dead. The remains are at the Conger Funeral Parlors and services will be announced later.
