OFFICERS CATCH BAD CHECK PAIR AT ANNA SPRINGS

Lorraine Horton, 43 and Alex Jones, 31, were held in the county jail today facing bad check charges following their arrest Sunday afternoon at Anna Springs in the Crater Lake National park while on alleged flight from Medford. The man and woman are accused of having worked with George Williams, claimed to be the lender of a small bad check ring which left worthless paper in Medford and Ashland to the extent of \$154.

Two \$15 checks were passed by the two at the Buster Brown Shoe Store and the Men's Shop, according to the sheriff's office. They will probably be turned over to the grand jury for investigation.

Jones claimed he was working for Williams and had only begun last week, and picked the woman up on the highway a day or two later. Williams is accused of having drawn a check on a defunct Idaho bank in payment for a ranch in the Talent district in order to receive some standard to indicate that the worthless checks were good, according to Sheriff Jennings.

The sheriff's office was called when actions of the trio aroused the suspicion of an Ashland merchant when he was asked to sell a coat last Sunday. Shortly after the trio fled the sheriff was on the trail and had park rangers stop them at Anna Springs. Williams managed to get out of sight of the rangers and escaped. He is still at large.

He was said to have posed as a Lewistown, Ida., business man, and purchased supplies from various Ashland merchants with worthless checks and in Medford purchased an automobile and goods from local merchants.
