POSTPONE ACTION ASHLAND BRIDGE

No action was taken by the county court this morning relative to the installation of the bridge formerly located across Rogue river at Gold Hill, at Ashland across Bear creek, as requested at the last meeting of the county court.

The county court looks with favor upon the proposition as a means of opening and developing territory east of Ashland, but objects to the plan as advanced by an Ashland delegation, for the location of the bridge within 2000 feet of a bridge across the same stream.

The court claims this would be a duplication of facilities and that the bridge should be located further south, so as to furnish a loop outlet in the event of the territory gaining population.

It was finally decided to postpone action until the sites could be visited by the county court and the county engineer and Ashland residents reconsider their proposals. The matter is scheduled to come up again next week.

GUCHES BANDIT TO MAKE PLEA TODAY; PAL STILL SOUGHT

Robert Ford, 23, arrested by the police as a suspect for the holdup of Ed Guches ten days ago, was scheduled to enter a plea in circuit court this afternoon. Ford was arrested Saturday for investigation and is said to have confessed to the crime, which enriched him approximately \$40. In his confession, Ford did not name the second party of the hold-up, but his arrest is expected to be made soon.

Ford was arrested by Chief of Police McCredie Saturday afternoon after having been under surveillance for a short time. In his confession, Ford relates he drove Guches' car to Klamath county and then back to Medford two days or so later. It was abandoned on Keene way, following a chase by local officers.

Ford does not appear to be the ordinary type of criminal and was friendly with officers this forenoon. He confessed to pointing the gun at Guches when he was ordered to drive his car out of the city to Rose Lane, where he was robbed of \$40 and forced to walk to Medford.
