OCTOBER WAS A VERY DRY, ALSO A SUNNY MONTH

The monthly meteorological report for October, 1929, follows:

The mean temperature for the month was 54.8 degrees, slightly above the average October temperature. The highest point recorded was 82 degrees on the 23rd and the lowest point reached was 25 degrees on the 29th. Daily ranges in temperature were about normal. The total precipitation for the month was 1.14 inches, which is 0.20 inch below the normal amount of October rainfall. The greater portion of this total precipitation fell during the period, October 6 to 9, inclusive. A moderate amount of rain fell on the 16th. Following the 16th the month was completed with but a trace, which fell on the 27th. As a whole the month was considered dryer than the usual October.

The prevailing wind direction was from the southeast. The total wind movement amounted to 2462 miles, moving at an average speed of 3.3 miles per hour. The maximum velocity occurred on the 28th when the velocity reached 19 miles per hour, blowing from the north.

The month was exceptionally clear with a total of 20 clear days, four partly cloudy and seven cloudy days.

Dense fog covered the valley and the surrounding valley on the 18th. Light fog occurred at scattered intervals during the month. Thunder storms were recorded during the rainy period on the 6th, 7th and 8th.

Light frost formed on the first day of the month and while there were several low morning temperatures during October no killing frost was recorded until the 26th.

INDEX STUDENTS AS EMPLOYMENT AID IN HI SCHOOL

In order to keep accurate records, and to facilitate the handling of employment at the high school, a card index system will be kept with all necessary information concerning students, who are available for positions. All students who wish to work after school, or on Saturday's, will register in the principal's office, and a card will be filled out for each applicant.

The registration card will contain the student's name, address, date of graduation, age, and name of parents. It will also include information concerning qualifications, training, and experience. A grading system will be used to indicate qualifications, training and data concerning experience will be obtained from those employing high school students.

The following personal qualifications will be graded: Appearance, ambition, initiative, absences from school, state of health, industriousness, amount of common sense, tardiness, courtesy, general responsibility, carefulness and self-reliance.

The types of training recorded are stenography, typing, penmanship, salesmanship, bookkeeping, English, mechanics, and shop work.

In order to complete the files, all persons employing high school students are requested to get in touch with the principals of schools, and give information concerning the students employed. The information desired is name and address of employer, type of work being done, and whether or not work is satisfactory.

The card index system was worked out by Principal B. H. Conkle, and will be kept under his supervision.

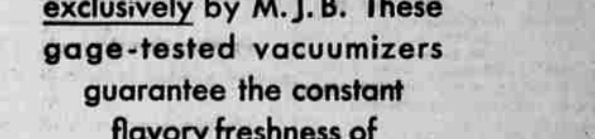
