

WHEN AIR LINER CRASHES IN FOG

Big German Plane Hits Hillside After Croyden Take-Off—Flame Burst Follows Accident—Two Escape With Lives.

MARDEN PARK, Surrey, Eng., Nov. 5.—(P)—Six persons were killed and two injured in the crash of a big German air liner bound for Berlin from Croyden yesterday. Those who were killed were passengers and three were crew members.

The crash, which was followed by the machine bursting into flames, was believed to have been caused by the pilot's flying into a hillside during a fog.

Within the remnants of the air liner was a large tree which had been torn from the ground by the force of the big machine. The crash and the burst of flames followed instantly.

Allen Kidston, one of the passengers, was able to crawl free, but found himself powerless to do anything to rescue the others as the machine almost instantly was fully ablaze. Prince Schaumburg-Lippe, second pilot, at first was thought to have been killed, but later was found to have escaped also.

The plane was owned and operated by the German Luftfahrt company. When she took off from Croyden everything about her seemed in proper order, according to an Imperial Airways official.

Later the identity of passengers was definitely established, as follows:

G. P. Milne, rector of Handerson & Company, Jew merchants, Calcutta; G. S. Gaspar, Sr., an employe of Handerson & Company, and D. L. Jones of Landover road, Stockwell.

Prince VonLippe was so severely burned about the face that he was scarcely recognizable. His clothing was burned from his arms and legs. Before being taken to a hospital he gasped: "I opened the window and crawled out."

RINTOWN, Pa., Nov. 7.—(P)—An air-mail plane, flying from Cleveland to Hadley Field, Newark, N. J., caught fire and crashed on the side of Big Mountain, three miles north of here, yesterday morning. The pilot, Thomas B. Nelson of North Plainfield, N. J., made a successful parachute jump and recovered five of the 18 mail bags in the machine. The other 13 pouches were burned. The plane was destroyed.

UMPQUA TURKEY SALE ANNOUNCED

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 7.—(P)—G. N. Savage company of New York and Swift and company are to receive the Umpqua Valley Thanksgiving turkey pool, according to the announcement made today by Herbert Beyers, manager of the Douglas County Co-operative Turkey Growers.

The birds killed for early shipment will be divided between the two concerns which are handling the turkeys on consignment basis for eastern markets. The association will grade the birds bought by the growers and will pay the cash advance on a basis of 22 cents for turkey, 29 cents on number one and 29½ cents on a number two grade.

MOUNTAIN STATES CUTS COOS BAY LIGHT COSTS

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 7.—(P)—The Mountain States Power company has filed with the public service commission a new tariff, reducing its commercial and residential lighting rates in the Coos Bay district, effective January 1. Rates affected are Marshfield, North Bend, Myrtle Point, Powers, Empire and Eastside. The reduction, according to the service commission, will save users about \$30,000 a year.

TALENT WOMAN CALLED TO BOSTON BY ILLNESS

TALENT, Ore., Nov. 7.—(Special)—Miss Iva Williams left Sunday morning for Boston, Mass., where she was called to the bedside of her father who is in a very critical condition in that city.

PORTLAND HOLD UP LUCKENBACH SHIP

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7.—(P)—Youthful diver pirates boarded the steamer Edgar F. Luckenbach today, bound for San Francisco. Albert and Elmer Atkinson, quartermaster, and robbed the ship's safe of \$397.60. They escaped.

Atkinson told police he had returned to the steamer early today and was in the pantry drinking a cup of coffee when a pistol was thrust in his back. He said he was taken to the main locker where he was bound and locked in.

Captain Alberts told police the thieves broke down his door and bound him with ropes to his bunk after forcing him to open the safe. Both ship's officers told authorities they recognized Peter Miska, 19, discharged boatswain of the steamer, as one of the pirates.

CHILOQUIN CHIEF DENIES FRAMEUP

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 7.—(P)—J. C. Swindler, chief of police at Chiliquin, denied yesterday there was any "political" move in the arrest Sunday of H. C. Spink, former justice of the peace and prominent Chiliquin resident.

It was also learned that Spink pleaded guilty when brought into court and charged with driving an automobile while intoxicated. Swindler, the arresting officer, charged Spink had liquor in his possession. Spink, released to the county hospital, still insisted it was a "political frameup," but refused to charge who did the "framing."

PORTLAND COP IS SUED BY HUSBAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7.—(P)—A suit demanding \$30,000 for alleged alienation of his wife's affections was filed today by Edward Schrader, Portland railroad man, against William A. Breuninger, policeman, and another suit, filed by Mrs. Schrader, asks \$2500 as damages for alleged assault.

Following the exoneration by the county grand jury of Mrs. Schrader, attractive swimming expert, on charges of having attempted to shoot Patrolman Breuninger, it was reported the entire case would be dropped, but this report today was denied emphatically by the Schrader family.

FIVE SUPERVISORS OF SAN FRANCISCO OUSTED

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 7.—(P)—Five members of the San Francisco board of supervisors were swept from office in the municipal election, a complete unofficial count disclosed. The five men were Con J. Deasy, Charles J. P. Powers, Milt F. Keat, Charles F. Todd and Walter J. Schmidt.

New supervisors elected are Angelo J. Rossi, James E. Power, Jefferson P. Garrity, Carl W. Miles, Victor J. Canepa and Thos. D. Garrity. Supervisors Franck K. Havenner, William P. Stanton and Jas. H. McSheehy were re-elected.

MADISON, Wis., Nov. 7.—(P)—The "unwritten law" justifying the slaying of a wife by a husband when she is found with another man, has no place in Wisconsin justice, the state supreme court ruled today in refusing the appeal of Louis M. Payne, who was sentenced to 20 years for killing his wife.

Payne's attorney appealed to the supreme court and contended that the slaying was justifiable under all laws of past history. The supreme court asserted, however, that an American court has never held "that an outraged husband may take the law into his own hands and slay, except in the state of Texas."

FATHER AIDS GIRL TO ESCAPE STATE SCHOOL

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 7.—(P)—Carter Ribbel of Oregon City is held in the Marion county jail for attempting to aid his daughter, Beverly Ribbel, to escape from the state industrial school on October 29. He will have a hearing in justice court today. When the escape was attempted, Ribbel is said to have been accompanied by another man, who is believed to have been the girl's sweetheart. The girl was taken from the two men after a fight between her father and one of the school employes.

KENTUCKIANS CARRY ELECTION WOUNDS

MANCHESTER, Ky., Nov. 7.—(P)—Taylor Harris, 42, was shot, Will Lipps, 45, was stabbed in the back, and three others were hurt and bruised in a fight over the election of a magistrate. It became known here today. The fight occurred in the Goose Rock precinct of Clay county in an isolated district.

Tom Lipps, member of the Clay county school board, surrendered to County Judge J. M. Little, in connection with the shooting of Harris. Officers were told that John Harris stabbed Lipps, who is in a serious condition.

ARREST SWINDLERS IN RESORT PROJECT

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 7.—(P)—Two alleged swindlers, H. E. Skinsner and E. J. Chambers, were under arrest here today despite their denials of any fraud in connection with the sale of stock, said to total nearly \$500,000 in value, in a proposed 17,000 acre summer resort project near Mantou, Colo.

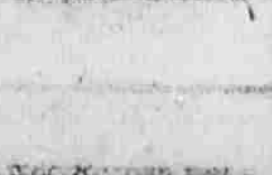
