

### FOOTBALL SCENES IN 'COLLEGE LOVE' CARRY CONVICTION

While the scenes of campus educational life with their pep music, rah rah and general effervescent undergraduate whoopiness in "College Love," the big feature musical and other sounds synchronized taking picture, which opened its three days engagement at the Craterian theater yesterday, are much overdone and overdone, they are nevertheless entertaining and colorful, and keep you interested while paying the way for the big football game of thrills and the incidents immediately preceding it.

For "College Love" is essentially a football attraction, the story opening with what is purported to be undergraduate dancing, singing, especially of jazz stuff, dancing and the like by the host of a party, fun-loving co-eds. And throughout it all runs a pretty theme song consisting mostly of choruses or piece club singing about the dear old college mater.

After wading thru this hokum by way of creating atmosphere, the football scenes come along with great relief to the audience, which from then on sits engrossed and thrilled by them.

In the face of the game here tomorrow between the U. of O. and O. S. C. freshmen teams, and the Armistice day game here Monday between Ashland high and Medford high, "College Love" is a peculiarly appropriate and timely attraction.

"College Love" grew out of the series of "Collegiate" popular short silent pictures into this feature length sound film. The characters are the same and the plot is along much the same lines as were those of the "Collegiate" series. It stars George Lewis as "George Wilson," the goodly, goodly, likeable and athletic young student, with pretty Dorothy Gulliver and Eddie Phillips as "Flash Thomas" in the leads. Then there is "Churchill Ross" as "Jimmie Reed," the lovable book worm and the hero's roommate; Hayden Stevenson, as the very personable football coach, and Sumner Getchell as good-natured "Pat," in the support, and many active boys and girls to give the campus atmosphere.

The panorama of college life portrayed includes, besides the football sequences, stirring auto-game football rally culminating in a spectacular torchlight procession, a cafe scene, witty wags and quips and repartee, and supposed general campus talk.

One of the wise cracks occurs during the football game when in the last quarter it seems that Caldwell College is doomed to defeat, and one of the despondent fair Caldwell co-eds remarks resignedly to her companion, "It would take an act of congress for us to win now." When the situation was hopeless the hero player was injected into the game by the coach, and his herculean work and a marvelous run with the ball brings victory to dear old Caldwell. Now, wasn't that nice?

Making the football sequences especially interesting is the fact that the famous Trojan team of southern California takes part in this game and that it was played in the famous Pasadena Rose Bowl. The moving pictures of the immense audience rooting last year at the game between the University of Southern California and Stanford, and that game itself, were cleverly intermixed with the film players of the "College Love" game.

A sound news reel and a short talking comedy, "His Rascals" are on the same bill. R. A. K.

### CHEST AID WOULD GIVE GIRL SCOUTS GREATER ACTIVITY

During May, 1927 the first Girl Scout troop in Medford was organized with an enrollment of twenty-five girls, ranging in age from ten to fifteen years. Within a few weeks this group had grown to sixty members, and it was necessary to divide them and create two troops. The interesting developing program of Girl Scouting continued to attract the local girls until the problem of organizing enough troops with trained leaders to accommodate them became an acute problem.

Miss Vaal Stark, regional Girl Scout director of Oregon, Washington and California then came to Medford and assisted in organizing a Community committee to govern and aid the affairs of local Girl Scouting. Under the leadership of Mrs. D. J. Wilson, voluntary director, a leaders' training course was given to a large group of interested women. With this leadership seven troops were formed, one in each of the four grade schools, two in Junior high and one in Senior high. Each troop averages a membership of twenty-five girls and has two leaders.
