

### BIG 7 WORKERS WIND UP SEASON WITH A BANQUET

### DEATH ASHLAND YOUTH MYSTERY

Coroner H. W. Conger today was still undecided whether to hold an inquest into the death Tuesday of Henry Lester Bauer, 15-year-old Junior high school boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Bauer of Ashland, caused by an injury said to have been received at the school grounds. The boy is declared to have died from a "burst" gall bladder; caused possibly from an external blow across the side.

The boy is believed to have been injured ten days or so ago, following an investigation by Ashland School Superintendent G. A. Briscoe. The boy did not complain of his injury until he was seized with violent pain Friday.

The body will be held in Ashland for three months and will then be shipped to Washington for burial.

### TRAIN TAKES LIFE OF ASHLAND MAN

Walking into the path of an approaching engine at noon yesterday, L. H. Coder, well-known Ashland Civil war veteran, was killed instantly at Ashland. He was 84 years of age and had been talking to some friends just before stepping onto the tracks, as the train was approaching a street crossing.

An arm and a leg were severed from the body and he was thrown 20 feet. Although Engineer J. E. Hanratty stopped the train within 30 feet, the old man was already dead.

He had resided in Ashland for the past 24 years and during the Civil war served with a Pennsylvania regiment. He is survived by his wife and eight children.
