

DANCERS, DOGS NATIONALISTS AWAIT RETURN CAPTURE HUGE OF MAYOR PIPES REBEL FORCE

Will Make Investigation of Matron Need at Local Halls Upon Return From Los Angeles—Dog Pound Presents Problem.

Sweeping Victory Along Honan Front Reported—Fifty Thousand Captured—Retreat to Westward—Shensi Chief Mobilizes.

Mayor A. W. Pipes plans to make a thorough investigation of the public dance question from all angles before appointing a matron to attend all such dances, as instructed by the city council last Tuesday, he said yesterday afternoon, but at least will not appoint a matron until his return from a business trip to Los Angeles, on which he departed last night. He plans to be gone several days.

The dog license question and ordinance requiring that dogs be kept at home all the year around passed several weeks ago and which has not yet been put into force, as well as the dog nuisance generally is a touchy subject with the mayor and city council.

The reason the ordinance to keep dogs at home has not yet been ordered into effect, Mayor Pipes said yesterday, is that this cannot be done until the city provides a place to impound or care for the stray dogs and others found at large.

Protests Filed.

It is known that Mayor Pipes and various councilmen have been hounded with protests from dog owners and lovers protesting against this ordinance, and it has been common talk on the streets ever since the ordinance was passed that one or more citizens opposed to it may bring court action to test the validity of the measure when the city officials attempt to enforce it.

It is also known that Mayor Pipes and several councilmen have had the idea in mind for months past of the city itself collecting the license for dogs under the city ordinance providing for it, instead of leaving the county court make the collections, under the state law, as last year, and turn the money over to the local Humane society, which organization would care for the dogs.

In this connection the citizens' budget committee cut out an estimated item of expense for next year of a dog catcher, etc. When asked about this recently Mayor Pipes said members of the budget committee thought that the humane society would take care of the dog problem for the city, if the collected license fees were turned over to it, and that Hamilton Patton, member of the committee, felt sure he could bring about this solution.

Matter Pending.

While the whole matter is up in the air just at present, it will undoubtedly be taken up in earnest by the city council before the passage of the budget ordinance on November 15. In the meantime the mayor and some humane society members are now considering the feasibility of the city leasing or purchasing the old Pacific Air Transport buildings on the fair grounds for the housing of the dogs found at large, and as headquarters for the city dog catcher.

SATURDAY NIGHT BALL CALLED OFF BY LEGION
