MOSES QUIP AT BANQUET ROUSES IRE

Reference to Independent Group of Senate Republicans As 'Sons of Wild Jackasses' Hit By Senator Wheeler—Reflection On Forebears Seen—Brookhart Also Rises.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—(AP)—The term "son of wild jackasses," a remark attributed to Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, in referring to the Republican independent group of senators was assailed in the senate today by Senator Wheeler, Democrat, Montana, who said constituents of the group would resent such statements and would take note of them in the next election.

Moses was quoted as having made the remark at a dinner for New Englanders here last night.

Continuing Wheeler said Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania, had described the western group as "worse than communists."

"These statements," said the Montanan, addressing himself to the Republican independents, "not only reflect upon you but they reflect upon your fathers and your mothers."

He cautioned the western group to remember these statements when they go out to campaign for the Republican party in the next elections.

Brookhart Rises.

Senator Brookhart, a Republican independent of Iowa, narrated the story of the 1928 "Wall Street booze party" in Washington, said it was apparent that the Republican regulars did not need "booze" at those dinners, to rise to the highest pinnacle of eloquence.

Referring to Moses, Wheeler, with a smile said, "there is no telling what he would have said if the dinner had not been dry."

Senator Heflin, Democrat, Alabama, observed that perhaps the remarks of the New Hampshire senator were inspired by the biblical idea that "the ox knoweth his owner and the ass his master's crib."

Wheeler suggested an interpretation by the president officer, Senator Moses was presiding. He asked with a smile if Wheeler were propounding a parliamentary question. Answering his own question, Moses said:

"If the senator from Montana will find a more appropriate application for this gyrating group, the senator from New Hampshire will be glad to have it."
