STANFORD HELD TO LONE SCORE; IDAHO MAULED

WASHINGTON STADIUM, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Eugene Bantz, the fiery little football coach of the University of Washington made his last stand in this horse-shoe stadium today and it was a glorious one even in defeat.

His ninchly battered Husky eleven held the highly touted Stanford Cardinals to a six to 0 score and gave the men from the south the scare of their lives on a mud-covered field.

Taking advantage of Captain Paul Jessup's feeble kickoff and Merle Hufford's four yard punt out of bounds from the Washington ten-yard line, the Red Shirts bowled over the winning score.

Taking the pluck on the Washington 14-yard line, Harlow Rothert, brilliant halfback, hit left end for ten yards. The Huskies made a determined stand but their effort was in vain. Rothert gained half of the needed distance around right end and Chuck Smalling, powerful fullback added two feet at center.

With a foot to go Smalling put his head down and smashed through center to barely reach the goal line for the touchdown which turned out to be the victory play. Rothert's place kick for the try point was blocked.

Coach Bantz was making his last effort on his home grounds as he will leave his coaching job at the end of the season. The diminutive mentor resigned recently but offered to remain with the team until the last scheduled game with Chicago two weeks from today. The Huskies will meet California in Berkeley next Saturday.

The Cardinals started another drive in the first period which was stopped on the Washington 17-yard line when they lost the ball on downs. From that moment until the end of the game the battle was a seesaw affair with 29,000 spectators in an uproar as the slippery ball was fumbled time and again.

The Huskies had "Pop" Warner's charges in hot water throughout the final period. Starting from mid field, a pass Green to Vantreke, put the ball on Stanford's 20-yard line. Hufford made it a first down on three plunges and Warner rushed his big fullback, Herb Pfeiffer, into the game.

Two more short gains and Captain "Mush" Miller raced to the line to stop the Washington offensive. Rothert's long pass went wild and Moffatt punted out of danger for Stanford but only for the moment.

Statistically Washington out-gained the Cardinals when the Huskies totalled 156 yards to Stanford's 64 on running plays. The Huskies made five downs compared with 11 for Stanford. Washington gained one by air and the Cards two on passes.

Idaho Crushed
PULLMAN, Wn., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Washington State's Oregon ripped the University of Idaho riders to ribbons here today, 41 to 7.

The Cosacs from Moscow tore into the fray with the whistle, leading power plays in the first half that bent the Cougar line in a semi-circle. W. S. C.'s return attack made the score 7 to 7 at the half. In the fourth quarter the Vandals went down like stocks on a bear market.

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP)—In a game featured by loose playing by both teams the College of Idaho defeated Pacific university here today 13 to 12. Both elevens were evenly matched, however, and the game was interesting if not well played.

Idaho opened the scoring in the first quarter by driving its way down the field to Pacific's five-yard line, from where Rutledge plunged across. The try for point by line-play failed.

Pacific rallied after an exchange of punts and at the end of the quarter was well into Idaho territory. On the first play of the second quarter, Frost, Badger half, went across. Pacific failed to convert. The Badgers scored again near the end of the same period and Idaho evened the count in the third. Rutledge's successful try for point proved to be the deciding play.
