### BULGARIA OVERRUN BY GOVERNMENT WORKERS

**SOFIA**, Bulgaria.—(AP) Bulgaria is suffering from a surplus of government employees. She must get rid of 10,000 of them not only for reasons of economy but because she has promised the League of Nations to do so in return for the help of that institution in procuring a stabilization loan.  
 In 1911 there were 49,000 civil servants in Bulgaria among a population of 4,400,000. Now, with 5,750,000 people within her boundaries, she has 84,000 functionaries, beside a large number who are not on the regular lists of the civil service. These figures exclude two thousand officers and men in the army.  
 The task of the government is made somewhat difficult by the fact that Bulgarian universities make a specialty of training students for this kind of employment. The ideal of the middle class is to obtain a government job with its resulting pension and other privileges.

### DORNIER BUILDS FLYING YACHT FOR 'GAR' WOOD

**FRIEDRICHSHAFFEN**—(AP) A deluxe flying yacht is being built here by the Dornier Works for "Gar" Wood, widely known motor boat racer, of Detroit. It is to be known as the "Do-Gar."  
 The giant flying boat will be of all-metal construction and powered by four American motors of 500 horsepower each. It will have a length of 82 feet and a wingspread of 161 feet. There will be two decks, the lower for the owner and guests, and the upper for the crew. The machine will have a cruising speed of 112 miles an hour.  
 The air-yacht is to be manned by a pilot, mechanic and steward. Mr. Wood, who is a pilot, intends to take the controls himself at times.

### WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

**By Herbert Himmer.**  
**WASHINGTON**, Nov. 12.—It's a mere wisp of a man who daffs stands on the floor of the United States senate to do battle with republicans in this great war on tariff.  
 His voice hardly can be heard when he rises in the center of the chamber to attack.  
 Reporters of the day of the day are move close to him. Newspapers men lean forward in the gallery. His colleagues are forced to listen intently if they are to catch his words.  
 But Furnifold McLendel Simmons is heard and feared. All recognize in him the tax expert and tariff adviser who has few equals—man, although past 75 years of age, still prepared to fight for ideals he has spent a lifetime defending.  
 Not the usual type of politician is Senator Simmons. He is as far removed from the handsomeness, baby kissing kind as one can imagine. Qualities of sociability, effusion and flattery are entirely lacking in his makeup. But at the same time he is as democratic and affable, kind and helpful as any man in the senate.

### His Farm Culls

His interest is first, last and always in his work. And while his duties in Washington are very close to his heart, he frankly admits that he would prefer to be back at his home in North Carolina and his farm in Jones county.  
 There are some 1,200 acres of his ancestral plantation. About 500 are under cultivation, with all modern methods and diversification being used scientifically. And it is in this farm and its acreage, home, that he hopes to move before very long and spend his remaining years.  
 Simmons came to congress as a representative back in 1886. He was on his honeymoon when his bride suggested that he run. He met success, only to be defeated in the next contest by a negro, James E. O'Hara.  
 In 1901 he entered the United States senate. His continuous service of more than 28 years makes him the ranking Democratic member of that body and second in service only to Senator Francis E. Warren, Republican, of Wyoming. But because of his previous term in the house in 1886, he now outranks any member of either party in both houses of congress, from the standpoint of first service.

### AIRPLANES DEFY CHANNEL STORM

**LONDON**, Nov. 12.—(AP) Eight persons were killed through accidents and drowning, many were injured, and enormous property damage inflicted in a gale which lashed the British Isles and surrounding seas last night and today.  
 The wind blew at speed varying from 50 to 70 miles an hour with occasional gusts reaching a velocity of 90 miles. Cross-channel steamers reported terrific buffeting by the waves, which often smothered them and sometimes over-topped their funnels. Passengers suffered severely from anxiety and sickness.  
 While some airplanes were forced to make safety landings, others made perilous trips between England and the continent astonishingly defying the gale.
