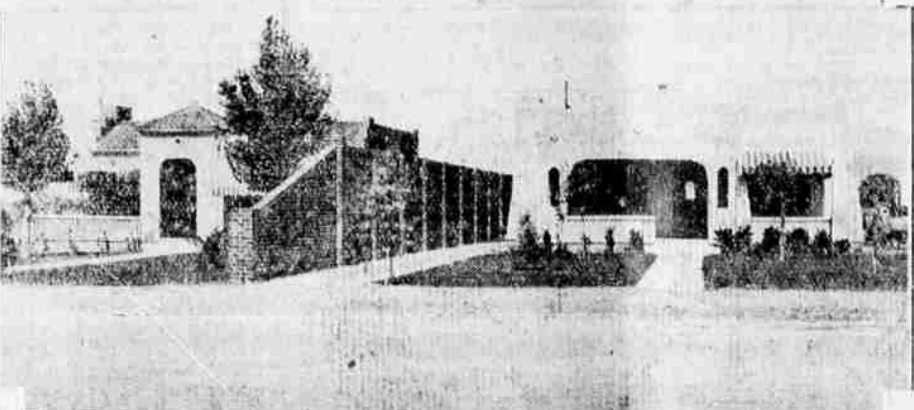

TRADITIONS OF PAST DISCARDED BY YOUTH, ROTARIANS ARE TOLD

"The rebellion of modern youth against external authority is all right, if an internal authority is substituted," declared Professor L. E. Messenger of the Southern Oregon Normal, who was the guest speaker at the Rotary club today.

"The traditions of the past are more or less discarded in modern education and the emphasis is placed upon prediction of business and social demands of the future, was another interesting statement made by the educator.

The development of specific abilities, rather than of general, and of personality traits in the individual, that will make him fitted to cope with life when he leaves school are other tendencies in modern education he said. GERMANS FACE BEER AND TOBACCO TRUSTS AS AID FOR FINANCES

BERLIN.—(AP)—The spectre of monopolies is hanging on the German economic horizon. With a monopoly on the sale of matches granted to the Swedish Match Trust, monopolies on cigars, cigarettes and beer are being seriously discussed in economic circles. Their establishment, politicians assert, would replenish the sadly depleted finances of the reich.

The match monopoly, for instance, will benefit the reich treasury to the extent of \$125,000,000. This will be loaned to the government by Ivar Kreuger, Swedish match magnate, who already controls the greater portion of Europe's output in matches. In return for the loan, Kreuger gets exclusive sales rights for all matches produced by German factories. Prices are to be fixed by the government and are bound to be higher than at present.

Whether beer and tobacco monopolies will be established is undecided, but well-informed circles believe they are inevitable. The consumer lives in constant dread of their becoming a reality. The fact that the German people spent \$1,200,000,000 for drinks in the fiscal year 1927-1928, and nearly \$1,000,000,000 for tobacco, shows how important a revenue the reich would derive from these items.
