For this reason a number of Chinese girls who are taking up medicine— even furthering their education on the subject in this country so as to be of aid to those of their own sex in their native country.

Miss Milam established the first home economics department of China at the Peking university at the time of her visit, having gone to that country under the auspices of the Chinese university and the Women's Foreign Missionary society of the Methodist church.

Among the many humorous customs related by the interesting speaker during her talk, were the greetings and trends of Chinese conversation. Upon meeting any one in that country, one of the first courteous things to ask is, "How old are you?" To appear older than one's age is a compliment, she said.

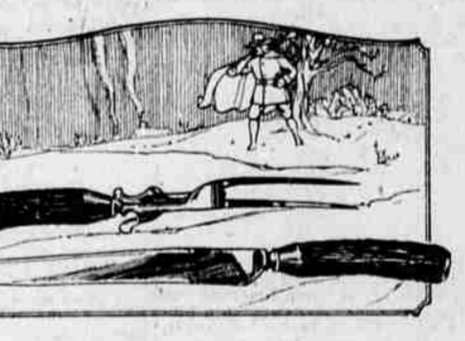
