

TALENT TURKEYS VEGETABLES AND FRUIT IN DEMAND

TALENT, Ore., Nov. 14.—(Special.) Apples and produce of all kinds are moving readily in this district as well as some livestock. Approximately 4000 turkeys were raised in Talent and vicinity. Some have already been sold at an average of \$1.00 each.

Among the heaviest breeders are Mr. DeFord, Mrs. Stratton and O. L. Pender of the Valley View district, and Earl Jones, Harry Lynch and Earl Duncan of Wagner Creek.

Dairy cattle are in very fine condition and barns are overflowing with alfalfa hay. William Kamberg of the Pleasant View Farms, harvested 25 tons of tomatoes from one acre and sold 2500 pounds of peaches from 14 trees. Mr. Kamberg is an experienced poultry breeder and intends going into the poultry business here in the near future.

Mr. and Mrs. William Broese, residents of Talent since 1884 and who for many years have trucked gardened on their acre tract, known as the "Evergreens Gardens," report a very successful season. Mr. Broese has a pear tree which has five different kinds of pears each season.

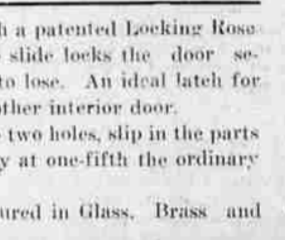

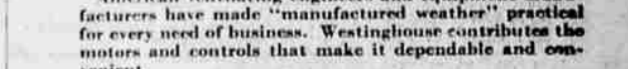
