

# HOME BOYS FAVORED IN GRID MENU

## Notre Dame, Pittsburg, Tennessee, Purdue and Yale Figure As Favorites in Saturday Clashes—Soldier Field Will See Huge Crowd—Bears Favored On Pacific.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The odds are with the home forces in the big conflicts of the grid-iron tomorrow, if Soldier Field is considered as "home" for Notre Dame in its clash with the Trojans of Southern California.

In the five games of most significance, so far as the championship situation is concerned, nationally, the Hoosiers figure to start with an advantage over Southern California, Pittsburg appears to have the edge over Carnegie Tech, Tennessee is a slight favorite over Vanderbilt in the outstanding southern fray. Pittsburg seems destined to stop Iowa and Yale looks too strong for the Princeton Tiger.

It will take tomorrow's fray to determine whether the Bearish movement among the favorites is still on, with the underdogs again enjoying a field day such as they had last week.

One of the contrasting features of these outstanding games tomorrow is that while less than 50,000 spectators will witness the Tennessee-Vanderbilt and Purdue-Iowa games, because of the limited facilities, approximately 250,000 will see the other three games.

Expect 120,000 fans. Close to 120,000 fans are expected to pack huge Soldier Field for the Notre Dame-Southern California contest, with 75,000 in the Yale bowl and more than 60,000 in Pitt stadium.

In nearly every sector of combat tomorrow promises to witness close and exciting action between old rivals. In the east, Cornell stakes an unbeaten record against Dartmouth with at least an outside chance of victory.

Colgate is the favorite against Syracuse, but it's another rivalry incomplete with the evidence of upsets.

In the Big Ten, with Iowa and Purdue holding the spotlight, Minnesota and Illinois will attempt to keep within striking distance of the top by seeking the scalps of Michigan and Chicago respectively.

Defeat for Purdue will seriously alter the entire situation.

Nebraska will move one notch toward the Big Six title if it triumphs over Oklahoma, although the Cornhuskers still have the Kansas Aggies and Iowa State to meet.

After an epidemic of scoreless battles, the Southwestern Conference hopes to produce more decisive action when Baylor meets Southern Methodist and Texas tackles Texas Christian. All four are in the championship scrap.

California's tussle with Washington takes on added interest since the Huskies held Stanford to a 6-0 margin, but California's Bears figure to win and stay at the top of the conference scrap.

### TENGFENG BATTLE DECLARED SEVERE

SHANGHAI, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The battle of Tengkeng between the Nationalist government troops and the rebellious Kuomintang "people's army" has begun and the fighting is most severe, said dispatches received here today from Honan province.

Corbett has boxed some of the best men in California and is declared to have a T. N. T. wallop in both fists. A knockout is expected when these two men meet.

The colored scrapper has met such stars as Tuffy Griffiths, Al

Johnson Joe Gans, Walford Lathford, Charles Bellman, Red Thibon, Walter Cleburn, Red Stanley, Gene O'Grady, and others. He prides himself on walking right into a fight and swapping blows every second with his opponent. In meeting Corbett, White meets the same type of fighter.

In the semi-final, a new face will appear when Joe Martinez of San Francisco, a crack lightweight who has won his last 11 fights by knockouts, will meet Billy Breedlove of Bond. The Bond boy and Teddy Mike of Los Angeles, in the last card here, nearly stole the show with their fast and scientific boxing. Other preliminaries are promised to be as good as those seen on previous cards.

Finishing touches were put on the Rooks last night and Dick Newman, coach, said he expected to see them sally forth with colors flying at the end of the fourth quarter with enough points to assure victory. He declared they would make as good a showing as they did in Medford last Saturday.

The Orange babes have been strengthened materially by the return of all the veterans who have been sitting on the bench since the bus accident four weeks ago.

Newman has paid special attention to the defense of his squad, as he hopes to stop the whirling and dashing line plays which called the Oregon infants to ground their way to a touchdown in the fourth quarter of the Medford tilt.
