

FARMERS WORRY IN SAMS VALLEY AS RAIN LACKING

SAMS VALLEY, Ore., Nov. 21.—(Special.)—Sunday morning was the first here for a week that the ground has not been covered with a heavy coating of frost. The milder spell, as usual, lasted but a short time and the thermometer dropped back again Monday morning to the prevalent freezing weather. As low as 12 degrees has been reported by some of our residents during the past two weeks. The farmers are becoming more deeply concerned each day over the discouraging prospects for next year's crop. The dry season has resulted in several deep wells having been drilled in this district, with promise of several more.

DOWIE'S WIDOW TO OPPOSE OVERSEER

ZION, Ill., Nov. 21.—(A.P.)—Mrs. Alexander Dowie, widow of the founder of the Christian Catholic Apostolic church, has accepted an invitation to return to Zion, seat of the church, and lead the group that opposes the overzealous of Wilbur Glenn Voliva. Mrs. Dowie wrote Tuesday from Greenburg, Ohio, she was convinced the healing power of her late husband had been transmitted to her. She plans to conduct services in Bethesda house, headquarters of the "independents," and bless and lay hands on the afflicted who wish to be healed, her friends said. There are about 100 in the group opposing the leadership of Voliva, who succeeded to leadership upon the death of Alexander Dowie. In recent years Mrs. Dowie has lived away from Zion with her son, Gladstone Dowie, an Episcopalian minister.

MCDONALD ASSAILED FOR NAVY ATTITUDE

LONDON, Nov. 21.—(A.P.)—Prime Minister MacDonald was bitterly criticized today for "kow-towing to President Hoover in settling the British navy's strength," by P. J. H. Hannon, conservative member of the house of commons. Mr. Hannon, addressing the conservative canvassing corps on imperial preference in tariffs, said that "all this lofty talk with America, all these negotiations heralded abroad by ten thousand headlines in the press, all this talk of a five-power conference to settle our naval parity, would be unnecessary if the British empire were the great united whole it ought to be."

COTTAGE GROVE HIRES NURSE FOR DIPHTHERIA

Napa Miners Killed

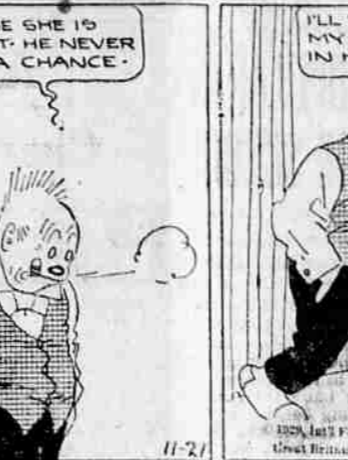
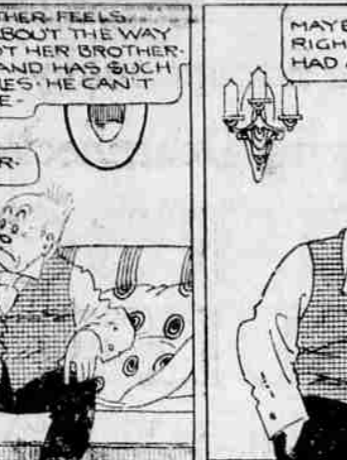

SAVE HUGE SUM BY STATE TEXT BOOKS

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 21.—(A.P.)—Arthur Brock, foreman of the state printing plant and member of an interim committee created by the 1929 legislature to investigate the advisability of state printing of textbooks, declares that state printing of text books for the grade schools would save parents over \$100,000 a year. 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ENGLAND LOWERS BANK LOAN RATE

LONDON, Nov. 21.—(A.P.)—The bank rate was reduced today from six to five and one-half per cent. Since the discount rate of the United States Federal Reserve bank recently was lowered, discount rates here have been adding to the assumption that a lower official minimum would be established. The bank of England has had difficulty in making the six per cent rate imposed, October 31, effective.
