# WALL STREET WILL RESUME FULL SESSIONS

Old-Fashioned Trading Seen Today—Speculative Favorites Sell Off—Utilities Show Gains—Holiday Is Blamed for Losses.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Wall street witnessed an old-fashioned trading market today in which the general list failed to make much progress in either direction. Several of the recent speculative favorites sold down 1 to 7 points, while a fairly long list of public utilities, rails and specialties were marked up 1 to 12 points. Trading was fairly heavy in volume.

Governors of the Stock Exchange voted to resume the five-hour trading sessions Monday, but authorized a three-day holiday beginning Thanksgiving day. There was nothing in the day's news to account for the selling in today's market, but in view of the approaching two-day holiday and the fact that prices had been rallying for three days, a nominal setback in the trading favorites was regarded as natural.

Otis Elevator ran up 12 points. People's Gas 10 1/2, Jersey Central 10, J. I. Case 9 1/2, United States Industrial Alcohol, 7 1/4. Stone & Webster 5 1/2, and Underwood & Elliot Fisher, Wright Aeronautical, Delaware & Hudson, Brooklyn Union Gas, Safeway Stores, American Machine & Foundry, American Water Works and Missouri Pacific sold 4 to 6 points higher, although some of the gains were reduced by profit-taking.

On the other hand, General Electric fell 7 1/2 points, but rallied several points from the low, and Anacosta, Air Reduction and United States Freight fell 4 to 5 points before they met effective support. United States Steel common was under pressure during the greater part of the session but fluctuated within a range of a few points. American Telephone, Bethlehem Steel, Johns-Manville, Atchafalaya and Union Pacific also encountered rather heavy selling.

# FLOREY WINS IN INSURANCE SUIT

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 27.—(Special)—A jury in Judge Bean's court late yesterday returned a verdict in favor of Andrew J. Florey of Medford in his suit against the government to recover the benefits of a reinstated and converted \$10,000 war risk insurance policy. By the verdict the jury dated Florey's total and permanent disability back to January, 1928, when he allowed his converted policy to lapse. Florey brought suit once before to recover on his original war risk policy and to date his total and permanent disability back to the date of his discharge, April 19, 1917. He lost this case on the government's showing that he had allegedly been not totally and permanently disabled when he reinstated and converted his policy.

# JOSEPH IN PROTEST ON LAIR THOMPSON

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 27.—(AP)—George W. Joseph, Portland attorney, today filed with the supreme court a protest against the appointment of W. Lair Thompson to serve as one of the prosecutors for the state in the disbarment proceedings against Joseph and Thomas Mannik. The court has not yet acted on the protest.

# BUYER OF LIQUOR MUST TIP COPS OR BE FELON

PEORIA, Ill., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Every person who buys a drink of liquor and does not report the fact to the proper authorities is, under the Jones law, a felon. Federal Judge Louis Fitzhugh declared from the bench today as he upheld the constitutionality of the law.
