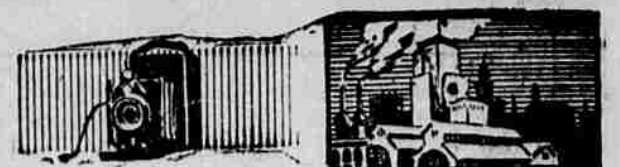


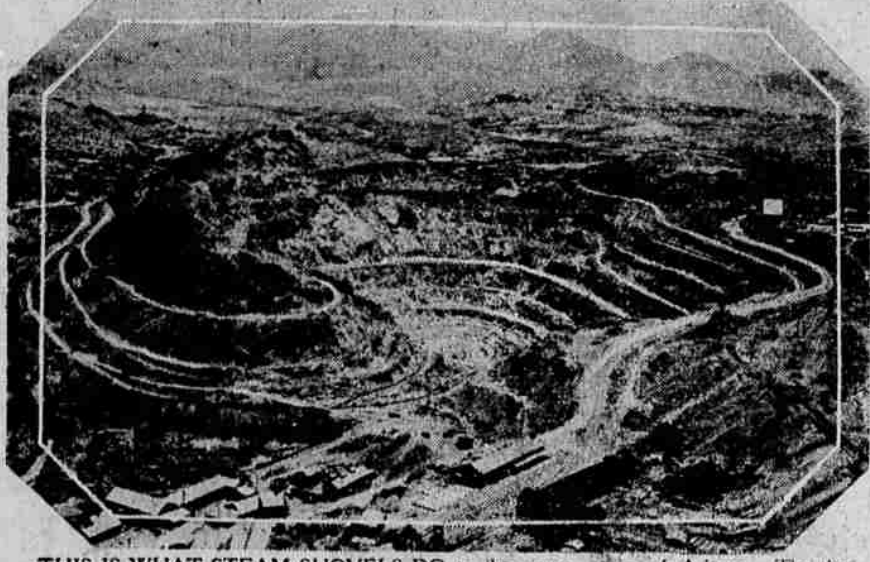
CAMERAGRAMS

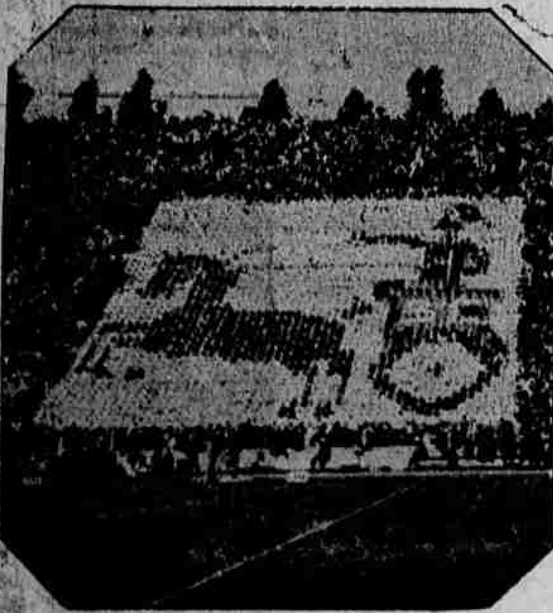

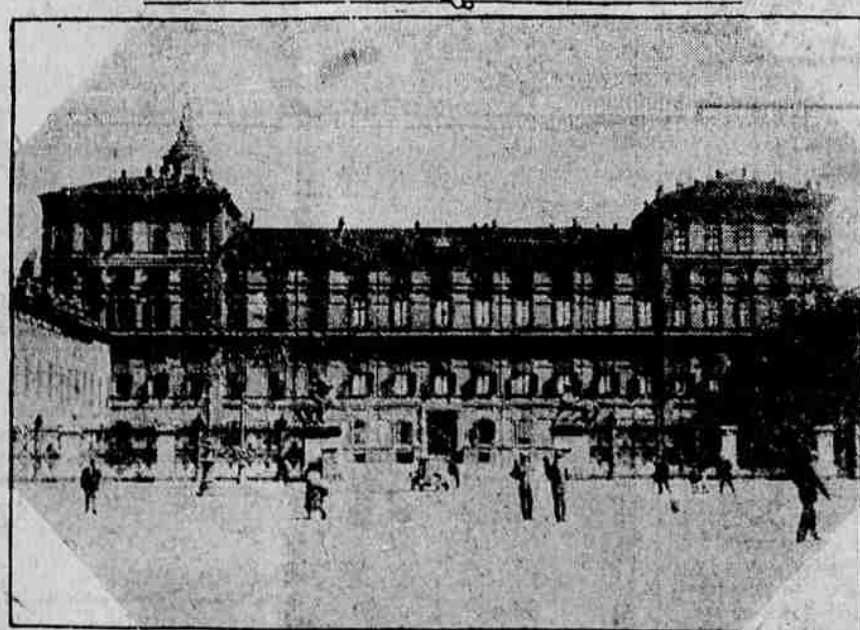

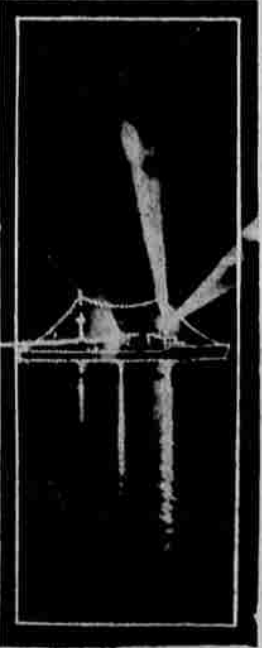

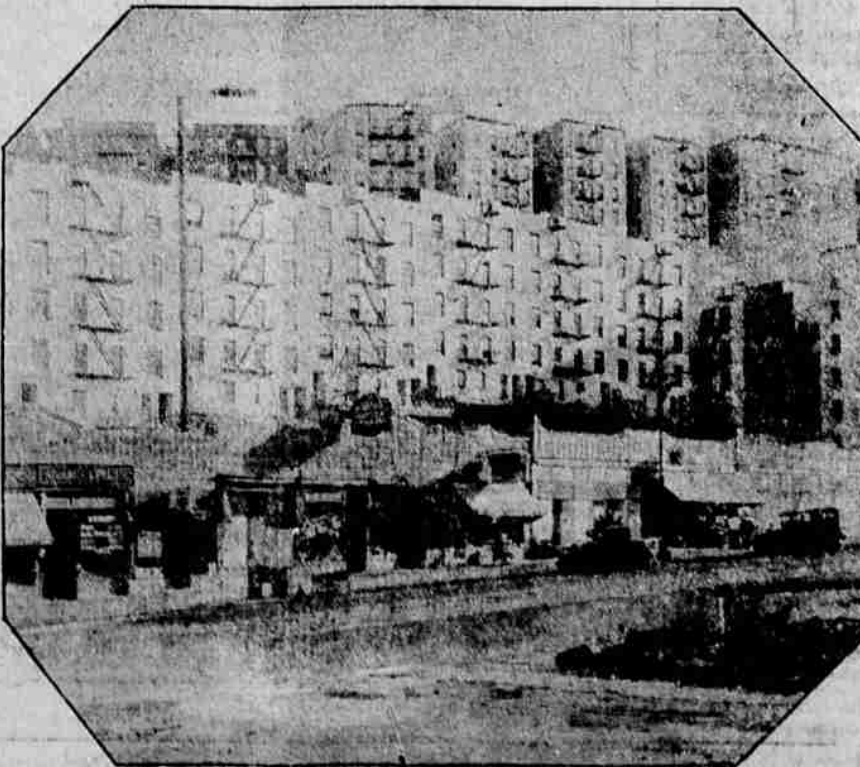
