

400,000 SEALS IN MAIL THURSDAY IS QUOTA OF COUNTY

The Christmas seal is proud of its family tree. And, like many people, it traces its ancestry back to the old country.
One Christmas eve a postal clerk in Holland, Einar Halbaell, was busily engaged in sorting mail. As he passed over the many letters and packages his train of thought was on the small cost of the stamps and he reasoned that maybe people would be willing to spend a little money for stamps for tuberculous children. Next year the idea was executed and a health message was started which has traveled through all the postoffices of the land.

Miss Emily Bissell, a Red Cross worker, was interested in a small tuberculosis sanitarium. She read about this Danish postman and from that started the idea herself. The next year the American Red Cross carried on the enterprise on a nation-wide plan. From 3000 in 1907 the sales grew to 300,000 in 1910, and to over 5,000,000 in 1927. The decrease in tuberculosis in the United States is in direct ratio to the money raised. The Jackson County Health association is sending out 400,000 Christmas seals to be mailed Thursday and it is believed that a great percentage of these will be bought, for as the work grows people see the value of it and are more ready each year to help.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 26.—(AP) After having been closely identified with the lumber industry of the Pacific Northwest for 25 years, O. M. Clark, 78, founder of the Clark & Wilson Lumber company, died at a hospital here yesterday. He had been ill only a short time. Funeral services will be held Wednesday.

Mr. Clark was born in 1851 in Ontario, Canada. In 1894 he came to Portland and established the Clark & Wilson Lumber company and the Portland & Southwestern railway.

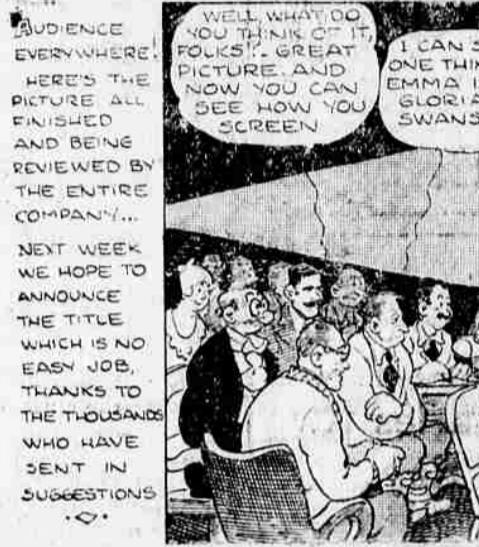

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 26.—(AP) Summer has not departed entirely from those who still long for fresh home-grown cucumbers. A leading produce company reports daily shipments from the fertile gardens in the Eugene section. They whole-sale for \$1.25 a dozen.

California tomatoes are ruling the market now at \$3 to \$3.25 a lug.

California lettuce has replaced the Oregon variety and sells at \$4.25 to \$4.50 a crate.

Lemons, which have been perched around \$15, have descended to \$12 to \$13.50.
