

POST SPONSORING THURSDAY DANCE ORIENTAL GARDEN

Medford Post No. 15 of the American Legion will hold another big dance on next Thursday night, Thanksgiving, at the Oriental Gardens. This party is one of a series being sponsored by the local post throughout the year. Part of the receipts will be used next July when Medford will dedicate the new airport.

At a meeting held last night, reports were given by the Armistice Day committee showing that day to have been a financial success, as well as 175 members having paid their 1930 dues.

The committee heading the football game between the Oregon Frosh and the O. S. C. Frosh, reported a profit of \$300, and thanked the public for its generous support. Another such game will probably be sponsored by the post next season.

Commander Hob Duval announced that the officers of Medford post are very anxious to learn of any Gold Star mothers or Gold Star wives residing in this locality, whose names are not already on file. This information is desired by the government, as they are giving a complete tour of France with all expenses paid.

It was pointed out that a Gold Star mother or a Gold Star wife (unmarried widow) is one whose son or husband was killed or died during the World war and is still buried in France.

An invitation to hold a joint meeting and "feed" with the Legion Auxiliary on the night of Dec. 23 was accepted by the post, the place to be announced later.

Only two members were reported as still being in the Veterans Hospital No. 77 at Portland, at this time.

The post gave special tribute to Premier Clemenceau of France, known throughout the world as one of the important figures during the war.

One of the prominent members was given a jury trial on a minor charge and the verdict resulted in a hung jury and much entertainment.

After the meeting a joint feed given by the auxiliary was enjoyed by the many present.

TENGWALD OPENS AGENCY HERE 1909

The Carl Y. Tengwald Insurance agency was established in 1909, with headquarters in the Hotel Holland building, the present location. Vern C. Gorst, Portland pioneer in automobile bus transportation of Oregon and air mail operation of the Pacific coast, is to serve as director and actively participate in operating management of Air Ferries, Ltd., at San Francisco, according to word received here.

The air ferry firm is to operate a flying boat service for San Francisco bay and Sacramento river points similar to that carried on by Coast Air Transport, Inc., between Seattle and Bremerton.

Gorst has made several recent trips to San Francisco to inspect terminals and fly over the route of the projected service.—Portland Journal.

PLANE LANDS IN FIELD WHEN OIL LINE CLOGGED EN ROUTE GRANTS PASS

Lacking information regarding the condition of the Grants Pass airport, J. C. Scott, aviator for the Sunset Flying Service, landed his plane in a plowed field on a farm between Gold Hill and Foothills creek Monday, rather than take a chance on flying to Grants Pass.

The pilot was bound from Marysville to Grants Pass when his oil line began to give trouble. He landed the machine on the farm of A. E. Birdseye, with the terrain of which he was familiar, made some temporary repairs and flew back to Marysville, without completing his journey to Grants Pass.

Some Grants Pass citizens happened to be talking to the owner of the farm when the plane landed, and in conversation with the pilot, he gave them his reasons for not continuing on to this city. "I could have gone on as easily as not," said the pilot, "but I didn't know in what shape the Grants Pass field was, and was afraid to risk it. I heard the county commissioners up there had turned down a proposal to fix up the field. Next time I'll know enough to fly and land up there," he is reported to have said.—Grants Pass Courier.

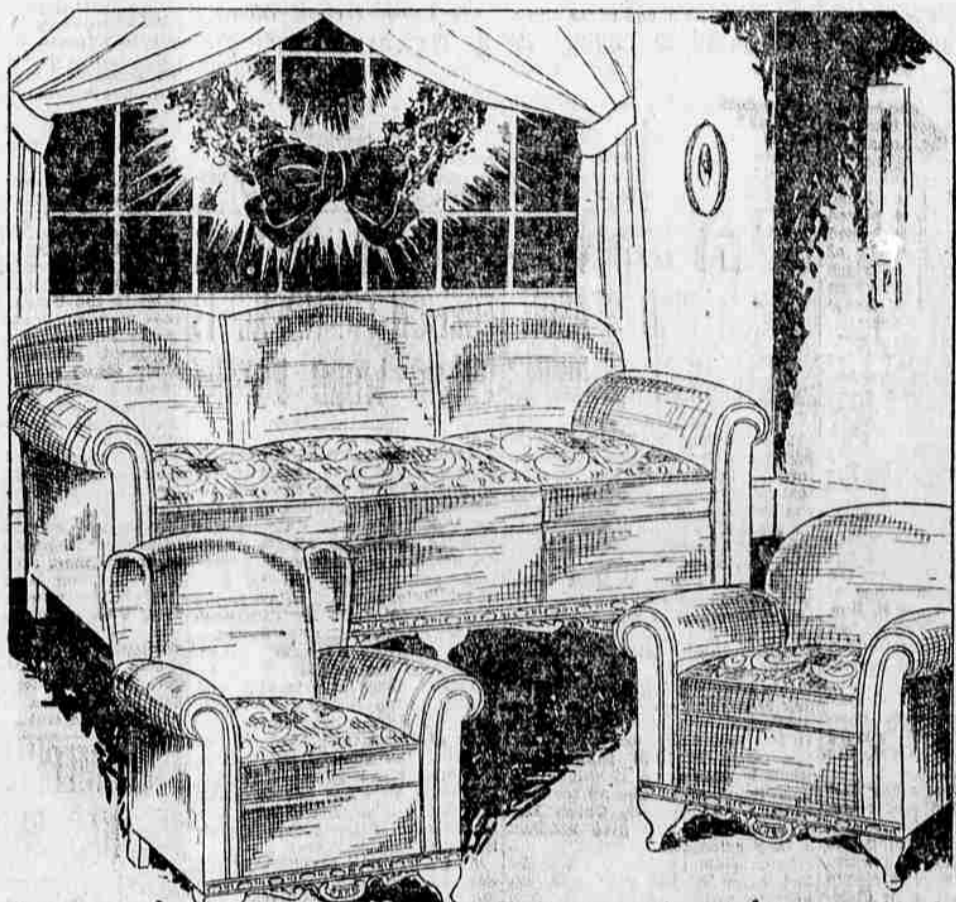

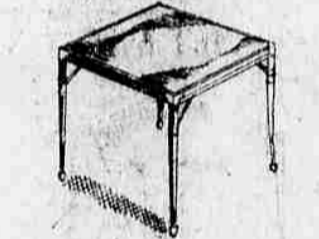
