## TROJANS PLANNING COUGAR DOWNFALL BY TIGHT DEFENSE

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 26.—(AP)—A defense against the hard-hitting attack of the Washington State Cougars with Elmer Schwartz the leader in these ground gaining tactics, is the problem which faced Coach Howard Jones' University of Southern California football team today.

## WASHINGTON HIGH POINTS FOR BEND

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 26.—(AP) Eldon Jenne, coach of the Washington high school football team here, was hurrying his squad thru elaborate final training this week in preparation for the "intercollegiate" game here Thanksgiving day with the Bend high school team. The game will be played on the Multnomah stadium field.

The Bend Lava Bears are said to have the highest scoring average in the state. In nine games they scored 229 points against 24 points made by opposing teams.

Washington has made 172 points against 19.

The Washington team yesterday was awarded the city trophy emblematic of the city championship.

## CURTAIN LIGHTING, WORD TO TACOMA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Seattle and Tacoma must cut their consumption of electric power to an absolute minimum if they want the navy to consider locating their aircraft carrier Lexington as an auxiliary power plant. Secretary Adams today informed a delegation from the two cities.

Senator Jones and Representative Johnson, Republicans, of Washington, and representatives of the two cities, said the mayors of Seattle and Tacoma would be called by long distance telephone immediately and asked to furnish the navy with assurance that all unnecessary lighting would be discontinued.

## BLAST INJURES MANY SHOPPERS IN MARKET

ESSEN, Germany, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Eight persons were injured seriously and four others hurt slightly in a terrific explosion this morning in the public market Halton Weberplatz. The blast was attributed to gas leakage. It was feared there might be other victims in the debris.

The market hall collapsed in the explosion, burying shoppers. There was considerable material damage.

## KEROSENE CANCER CURE TRIED IN NEW ZEALAND

AUCKLAND, N. Z.—(AP) Kerosene injections have been used as a treatment for cancer in the Auckland hospital.

A resident of Frankton was brought to the hospital two years ago suffering from what the hospital authorities diagnosed as cancer. He was given the kerosene treatment for a year and declared, apparently cured. Since then, the doctors claim, there has been no recurrence of the disease and a recent examination by the health department revealed only a cavity where the growth existed.

The kerosene was injected at a high temperature and allowed to cool to blood heat. The process was unpleasant and painful but the doctors believe that the cure was worth the trials of the treatment.

## Hip Flasks Much in Evidence at Big Football Games, Is Charge

LYNN, Mass., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Mayor Ralph S. Iauer saw so much drinking at the Harvard-Yale football game at the Harvard stadium Saturday that he has ordered the Thanksgiving day high school contest here to be bone dry or be stopped.

Twelve thousand persons at the stadium, he estimated today, were more interested in quart bottles and hip flasks than anything else. Many women "took a pull out of the bottle the same as the men," he said, and neither police nor the faculty interfered.

The Rev. Garfield Morgan, pastor of the Center Congregational church, according to the mayor, was approached by some one in a big fur coat who said to him, "You look like an old timer, have a drink."

"Can this," he asked, "be the same Harvard of which the late President Eliot used to boast the factor that made it the dominant educational institution of our land was that she had been building men for nearly 300 years?"
