

# OREGON TO GIVE COURT ORDERS DATA ON WATER MAINTENANCE PUBLIC DOMAIN FOR MRS. GORE

### Chinnock Names Luper, Dana and Oakes As Special Committee Oregon Reclamation Congress — Sentiment Not Defined

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 27.—(AP)—State Engineer Rhea Luper, Marshall Dana of Portland and Ivan Oakes of Burns have been appointed by James Chinnock, president of the Oregon reclamation congress to furnish data on reclamation for President Hoover's general committee on public lands. This data will be for the general committee's use in recommending changes of policy in the reclamation and administration of lands in the public domain.

Dana is now on a tour of foreign countries and, since he will not return to Oregon until the latter part of the winter, it is probable that he will be supplanted on the committee by another member, for the reason that the data gathered by the three Oregon men must go before the Hoover committee for a meeting at Washington in December.

It is learned here that there is a break among the western states relative to the extent to which the rights to the public domain should be turned over to the states. Wyoming, Utah and New Mexico, because of their oil and coal deposits, are not satisfied with the proffer of surface rights only as proposed by President Hoover, but want all rights to the domain. Back of this is their objection to the policy whereby the federal government's royalty from coal and oil production is placed in the reclamation and apportioned among all the reclamation states.

The sentiment of the other western states as to surface and complete rights, it is said, has not yet fully developed.

# PILGRIMS PRAY AT GEMETERY GATES

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 27.—(AP)—A group of pilgrims gathered at the gates of the Roman Catholic cemetery here today to pray for the souls of the departed. The gates were closed to visitors Monday and the Roman Catholic church is investigating claims of cure after prayer at the grave.

Many of those who gathered near the gates had come from distant points without knowing of Cardinal O'Connell's ban. Their appeals to cemetery officials for admittance were unavailing. The number of supplicants was at no time more than 50, as compared with throngs numbering more than 100,000 who have visited the grave on several days.

# LAKE DRAGGED FOR KLAMATH HUNTERS

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Although many men spent the day dragging the bottom of Upper Klamath lake, the bodies of Ed Syfert and Ed Hart, Klamath Falls hunters, believed to have drowned while duck hunting had not been recovered today.

The empty boat, hired by the hunters, was found with the sides caved in, indicating an attempt had been made to push it thru ice-crusted water. A hunting boat, belonging to Syfert, was found yesterday.

# GREEN PEAS GAIN \$1000 PRIZE FOR CHAMPION CANNER

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Mrs. Mary Hvas of Kenosha, Wis., was awarded the title of America's champion home canner today, her entry of a quart of green peas winning the \$1000 grand sweepstakes prize for the finest jar of food submitted in the national canning contest. Another \$250 prize was given her for the best jar of vegetables.

Mrs. Hvas is 58 years old, the mother of two grown sons. She preserves from 600 to 800 quarts of food annually for her home.

A special \$1000 prize offered to the county home demonstrator whose canning activity brought the largest number of entries from her county was awarded to Elizabeth D. Barnard of Lake county, Ind., which had 317 entries.

The contest attracted entries from 25,000 women and girls throughout the country.

# STOCKS TAKE SHARP RALLY AT DAY'S END

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Sharp rallying tendencies developed in today's stock market after an opening flurry of selling had carried many issues down 2 to 4 points. Most of these early drains were made up, and a wide assortment of active stocks were marked up 1 to 19 points, with larger gains in a few specialties.

Short covering played an important part in the rebound of prices. The opening decline had failed to bring out any extensive liquidation of stocks and "bear" sellers, who had accumulated substantial paper profits in the last few days, converted them into cash by buying in their stocks. The low prices established by some of the high grade dividend paying issues also attracted some investment buying, which was reflected in the increased demand for stocks through the odd lot houses. Another flock of increased and extra dividends was announced during the day, most of them by small industrial corporations.

Demand Slows Up Weekly trade reviews called attention to a further slowing up in demand, but this was attributed, in part, to the retarded recovery of the automotive industry and approaching year-end inventories. Steel corporation subsidiaries were reported to be operating at 82 per cent of capacity as against 72 to 74 per cent a week ago.

There were a few soft spots. Persistent liquidation of Fox Film brought about sympathetic heaviness in other amusement shares. Baldwin Locomotive also was under pressure.

The late unsettlement was accentuated by a decline of more than two points in Pennsylvania on announcement of offer of rights and a drop in the amusement shares. Fox losing four points on the suit brought under the Clayton anti-trust act. Such issues as United States Steel, General Electric and Westinghouse sagged 2 to 4 points from their best levels of the day. The close was irregular. Total sales approximated 2,500,000 shares.
