SHIFT BUDGET SUMS TO MEET NEW LAW

To comply with a decision of the attorney general, and to comply with the new uniform accounting for county offices, to be placed in effect soon, the county budget has been altered. The \$24,100 appropriated for the purchase of new road machinery, including an oiler, was transferred from the road fund to the general fund. This makes no change in the budget, or the prospective tax levy, and simply shifts the amount from the road fund to the general fund.
