

ASHLAND TAKES FINAL GAME OF SEASON 19-12

Locals Weaken in Latter Part of Battle—Rulings and 'Breaks' Costly for Medford—Best Form of Year Displayed.

The Medford high school football team lost its annual Thanksgiving game to its ancient rival, Ashland, yesterday, before a large holiday crowd, 19 to 12.

The locals outplayed the foe in the first half, held them even in the third quarter, and weakened slightly in the final period. They played in the best form of the year.

They suffered a severe jolt early in the first half, when John Sprague intercepted an Ashland forward pass, and raced for a touchdown. The referee ruled Medford offside, and the ball was brought back. The same fate overtook the locals in the Armistice day game, after Harrington raced 54 yards through a broken field, at the hands of the same referee. This did not dim the fighting spirit of Coach Hagen's proteges, though they lost the advantage of the first score.

Ashland scored its first marker when Simpson got behind the Medford safety and snared a long pass from Hitchcock.

Tied at Half.

In the second quarter, just before the gun sounded, Harrington bucked across for a touchdown. Zumburn rushed from the bench, failed to kick the goal, and the score was tied at six-all at the half.

Medford's second score came in the third quarter, when Morris caught a forward pass, and raced 19 yards for a touchdown. Zumburn failed to kick the extra point.

Hitchcock earlier intercepted a forward pass, and raced 55 yards for a touchdown. No Medford player could catch him running up the young hillside. The extra point

was made on a forward pass, and the score was 13 to 12.

Ashland increased the margin when Spier caught a forward pass from McLeod. The whistle blew and Medford players gave up the chase. The referee reversed himself and the touchdown was allowed, after an inclination to disallow it.

Good Contest.

It was a well played contest, with Hitchcock performing in his usual style and Dick Applegate, back in the game, for Medford, the best ground gainer, until chased by the referee for slugging. The official at first cautioned Applegate and then hearing the shouts of "put him out," did so. Medford was penalized half the distance to the goal. Harrington also played a strong game for the locals.

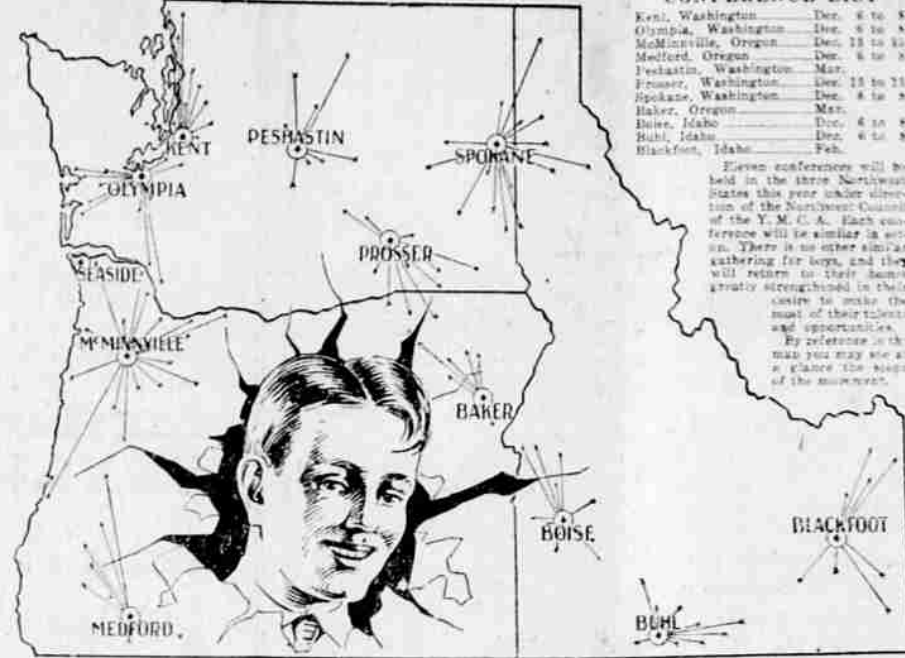
Medford made 12 first downs, and Ashland six, but Medford could get none of the "breaks," and decisions put them in a hole several times. Most of the unfavorable rulings came when they hurt the most.

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PREPARE PETITION FLORENCE STREET

Good news to Medford people who have occasion to drive on Florence street, leading from East Main street to the Sacred Heart hospital, was the report today at the city engineer's office that a petition is being made for the construction of pavement, 16 feet wide, improving approximately 300 yards of street.

This section is said to be the roughest in Medford and especially bad for patients who have been moved over it, chuck holes and bumps making it hard for car drivers to drive up or down the hill to the hospital without causing discomfort for sick persons. It has been far from a pleasure for autoists in good health to drive over this street, which has been the cause of adverse comment for years, it is said.

Sisters of the Sacred Heart hospital last summer completed pavement around the buildings at their own expense in the thought that the city would soon construct paving from the hospital to Main street. This bit of work is pointed out as being one of the most needed street improvements in Medford and now that a petition is about to be circulated, it is possible the street will be in first class conditions within a few months.

In addition to leading to the hospital, Florence street also leads to quite a number of residences.

The pavement is to be constructed in such a manner that it may be widened when necessary demands.

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—(AP) Russell Berghern, Northwestern's workhorse backfield star, is placed at fullback on the 1929 all western conference football team, picked for the Associated Press by nine Big Ten coaches, and to place him there, the coaches elected to switch Brock Naguski, one of the Minnesota's greatest stars, from fullback to tackle.

SANDER READY TO TAKE PASSENGERS

Medford flying enthusiasts will have the opportunity next Sunday of flying in a big Travelator cabin plane from the new Medford airport at one cent per pound. The ship has room for six passengers, is piloted by Harold Sander, well known here, and will probably be in Medford three weeks to a month.

The one cent per pound rate will be in effect over the weekends only, the airplane being at the field during the week to make special taxi trips at \$12 per hour per passenger, with Crater Lake as a specialty. Since September 1st, the ship has taken up 2715 passengers on the penny rate, and has never experienced trouble of any kind.

The ship, of the monoplane type, has a 300 horsepower Wright whirling motor, capable of pulling the plane through the air at a high rate of speed. The cent a pound service will begin next Sunday.
