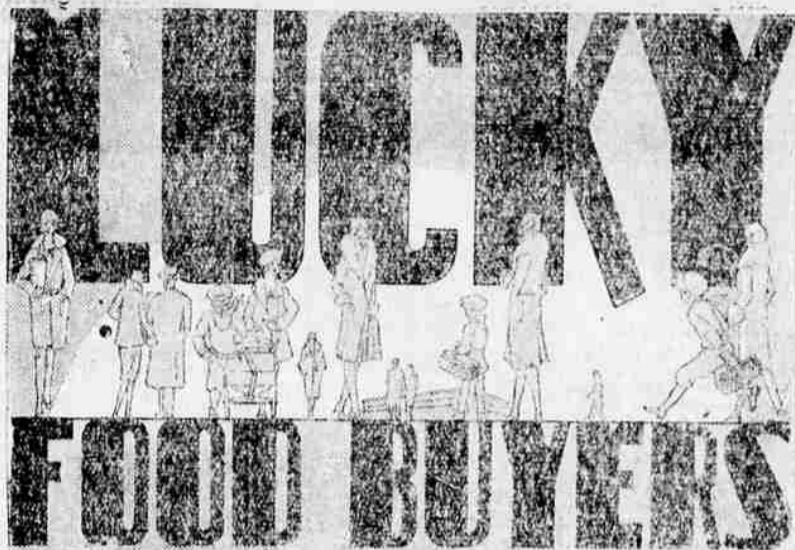

MENINGITIS TAKES ARCHIE J. MARTIN OF CENTRAL POINT

The first death by subal meningitis in Jackson county this year claimed the life Wednesday evening of Archie John Martin, 71 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Martin of the Central Point district. He became ill Tuesday evening and was rushed to the Sacred Heart hospital and died 24 hours later.

He had resided with his parents near Central Point for several years and for the past three weeks had been employed in Klamath

county at Medoc Point by the state reclamation bureau. With his work almost completed he came home to spend the Thanksgiving holidays with his family, but almost immediately upon his arrival illness overtook him.
He complained of a cold with aches in all parts of the body and the next morning complained of a severe headache. At 10 o'clock in the forenoon Archie became unconscious and was removed to the hospital, where he died the same evening.
He leaves his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Martin, one sister and one brother—Thorothy Martin and Edwin Paul Martin.
Funeral services will be held at the graveside in the Central Point cemetery, Saturday, November 30, at 10:30 a. m. Rev. Johnston officiating. Funeral arrangements in charge of the Perl Funeral Home.
