TROJAN ACE AND POWER DOWN W.S.C.

Cougar's Line Wilts After Even Battle — Fresh Reserves Complete Rout — Saunders Runs Wild For 21 to 7 Victory.

COLISEUM, Los Angeles, Nov. 30.—(AP)—The deceptive, driving runs of Russ Saunders, Trojan quarterback, today put to rout the sturdy Giants of Washington State, as the warriors of the University of Southern California pounded and passed their way to a 21 to 7 triumph before 35,000 fans.

But the Cougar aggregation for the Northwest was not subdued until it had thrown a scare into Coach Howard Jones' clan, scoring in the opening period and holding the men of Troy to a 7 to 7 tie for the first two periods of the game.

It was a battle of great lines at the start, with Coach Orin "Babe" Hollingbery's forwards willing before the character U. S. C. line late in the second quarter. The Trojans found their end runs turned into the side lines, while their smashing center plays were of no avail.

With the opening of the second half, the tiring effect of the superior Troy line began to show, and the never-to-be denied Saunders carried the ball twelve out of the fourteen plays which saw the U. S. C. ball jugglers go 78 yards to a touchdown from the opening kick-off.

The march spelled doom for the Cougar invaders, who fought valiantly but were being outclassed at every turn of the game. Saunders, besides turning in 135 yards in thirty attempts, scored the final Trojan touchdown when he drove, fumbled and fought his way through the Cougars on a 45-yard return of Porter Linnhart's punt in the third canto.

U. S. C. scored once in the second, and three times in the third period, with the final quarter resulting in a bloodless battle after Coach Jones had fielded steady streams of substitutes into his line-up.

The Cougars started their touchdown drive while the first period was yet young. An exchange of punts, and the invaders started a march toward, which terminated on the Trojan 26-yard line when Buckley's attempted place kick was short.

Coach Hollingbery's aggregation was not to be denied. The Cougars came right back with Buckley and Schwartz making good gains through the U. S. C. line. Buckley scampered 19 yards after taking a lateral pass behind the line of scrimmage. Schwartz crashed the center of the Trojan wall for ten more, putting the ball on the 43-yard line.

Here Ellington tossed the ball 18 yards to Jones, who plucked it out of the air with two Southern California players battling with him for possession. The Cougar right half ran 25 yards for a touchdown, with no one laying a hand on him. Buckley kicked goal.

Jones' fumble on his own 24-yard line, after the Cougars had held the Trojans for down, paved the way for the men of Troy to score their first counter. Duffield attempted to pass, but finding his receivers covered, he negotiated an end run which saw him go to the ten-yard line. Musick croaked the line of two attempts for a yard each, and then Duffield slipped through left tackle, cut back, and scored standing up.

Confronted by the old bugaboo of converting the point the Trojans held a long conference, before putting the kicking burden on Baker's shoulders. The big substitute guard kicked the ball squarely between the posts to tie the score.

After being held to a single first down in the first quarter, the U. S. C. platoon jugglers parade to 15 first downs by the time the final gun sounded. Eleven of these were made in the second half. Washington State collected seven first downs, all of them in the first and second periods.
