

ELDER'S SPRINT AS PASS FAILS DEFEATS ARMY

Record Eastern Crowd Shivers as Notre Dame Line, Repels Charges of Cagle and Murrell—Team Battles for Stricken Coach.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—(AP)—

Army's fighting football team stopped Notre Dame's stalwarts in all but 11 seconds of their annual football game today but in that 11 seconds the undefeated and united team from South Bend won the game. The score was 7 to 0, and 32,000 persons, a record eastern crowd, saw the battle that was desperately fought in bitterly cold weather.

Jack Elder, one of the fastest men in a football uniform in this country, won the game for the Ramblers early in the second period. He intercepted an Army pass at his own goal line and ran the length of the field for the only touchdown of the game. His time for the century with a football under his arm could not have been much more than that in which he is clocked when unencumbered with football paraphernalia and wears scuffer clothing.

The Notre Dame sprinter, doubling in football, leaped into the air to catch a pass from Cagle, intended for Hutchinson in a corner of the field, with one foot touching the goal line marker. From the standpoint of the Army no more unfortunate choice of a pass intercepted could have been made. Elder tucked the ball under his arm and started straight down the sidelines along the familiar distance—one hundred yards. No one had a chance to stop him.

Big Buster Perry, Army's star tackle, made one desperate headlong dive at the flying Elder at the 45-yard-line. He missed by a wide margin. Then Frank Carrideo joined the procession to run interference the rest of the way, but the assistance of the heavy quarterback really was not needed. Elder was running "for rock" and was not to be overhauled with a touchdown in sight. K. K. Roches, Notre Dame coach, was far from his team, suffering from phlebitis at his South Bend home, and the players were determined to beat Army today "for rock."

The situation had changed with dramatic suddenness. Just before Elder made a Notre Dame touchdown a fact an Army counter seemed about to materialize. The Cadets had been given a chance early in the game but could do nothing with it and then opportunity knocked again in the second period. Cagle and Murrell tore off two first downs to drive into Notre Dame territory at the great line with Cannon apparently in line with Cannon apparently here, there and everywhere stopped the drive and the Ramblers took the ball on the 20-yard-line when a pass failed.

Two smashes into the line availed nothing and Carrideo punted. The ubiquitous Perry rushed in to block the kick and when the smoke cleared away, Army was found in possession of the ball on Notre Dame's 15-yard-line. Cagle and Murrell plunged into the Notre Dame forward wall but gained only three yards between them and then the pass. Cagle shot a looping toss into a corner of the field, just at the goal line and Elder did the rest.

Elder was the hero of the game. For all around football playing the honors went to Captain Cagle, playing his last football game in the east, the elusive Cagle, for four years one of the game's greatest runners, not only contributed a goodly share of Notre Dame's anxious moments when the Army had the ball but he played one of the greatest defensive games of his brilliant career. Time after time, the star Notre Dame backs were at the line of scrimmage by the Army red-head stopped there. He made the longest run of the game from scrimmage with a 25-yard dash and with the exception of Elder's epochal sprint, his 34-yard run after receiving a punt late in the game, was the longest run of any character.

Notre Dame followed its usual strategy of starting its first string line and reserve backfield. The leading ball carriers were rushed in a body late in the first period. The record crowd shivered and cheered, the exciting play causing the fans at intervals to forget the bitter cold. This game marked the close of one of Notre Dame's greatest seasons.

The Army has one more to play against Stanford at Palo Alto, Calif., December 28. Notre Dame demonstrated today that it deserves its success while Army showed that it has had a great team all year, dogged by a cruel misfortune.

DETROIT MAULED BY D.S.C. NOSES OUT GEORGETOWN

DETROIT, Nov. 30.—(AP)—

Misus the services of Lloyd Brazil, their star back, and trailing by two touchdowns at the half, the University of Detroit Titans came back in the second half today to take advantage of the breaks and round out their 1929 football season with a 14 to 3 victory over Georgetown.

Nearly 15,000 persons braved a bitter cold to witness the game. The severe cold was responsible for a number of fumbles by both teams.

Brazil, who concluded his gridiron services for Detroit this year, was kept out of the final game by a leg injury.

The passing combination of Scantz, Senator quarterback, to Hudak, Georgetown, left halfback, accounted for both of the Senators' touchdowns. A short time after the opening of the second period, Scantz passed diagonally from his own 45-yard-line to Hudak who ran 40 yards for the first Georgetown touchdown. Mooney kicked goal.

The same combination accounted for the second and final touchdowns. As the period neared an end, Scantz flipped a short pass to Hudak over the Detroit right end and the Senator left half stepped across the goal line. Mooney's kick this time was blocked.

The Detroit touchdowns came in rapid order in the third period. Following Parasc's punt to the Georgetown 16-yard-line, Bordeaux and Young, Detroit end, and the ball rolled along the end zone, touched it for a Detroit touchdown. Parasc drop-kicked the extra point.

Three plays after the kickoff, Parasc intercepted Scantz's lateral pass and dashed 47 yards for the second Titan touchdown. The Detroit fullback missed the kick for extra point as both teams were offside, he got another chance. This time the kick was good.

BERKELEY OPEN WON BY SMITH IN SUB-PAR PLAY

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 30.—(AP)—

Horton Smith, golfing sensation from Dublin, Mo., tonight was declared winner of the first Berkeley \$5,000 open golf tournament. He required only 280 strokes for the 72 holes of medal play.

Smith, who started not-so-good with a 74 the first day, and took one over par yesterday, played two sub-par rounds today to win the now title. His 69 this morning, despite the fog, was followed by a phenomenal 66 this afternoon for the final 18 holes.

Billy Burke of Westport, N. Y., scored a 72 this afternoon to finish with a total of 282 and second prize money.

A score of golfers still had not reported their final cards when Smith and Burke finished, but their leads over the field were so great that they were assured of first and second places.

Johnny Popoff of Feather River, Calif., captured a 70 on his last round for a 288 total, which practically assured him third money.

CENT A POUND AIR SERVICE OPENED

The Copper King Aircraft Service will also take up passengers from the new Medford airport today for one cent per pound and also at the regular rates of \$4.50 for two passengers. The Copper King company, managed by W. J. Brown, will keep these rates in effect over the week-ends for a short time.

The company operates a two-passenger open airplane of the Travelaire type, capable of traveling over 100 miles per hour and ascending to high altitudes in a remarkably short time. The ship was kept busy Thanksgiving day taking up local passengers and during the week took two elderly women for their first ride. The Copper King service has been in Medford since last summer and is well known to southern Oregon aviation enthusiasts.

NAVY WINS FROM DARTMOUTH WHEN NEW STAR FOUND

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 30.—(AP)—

Waiting until the far end of a hectic season, Navy uncorked a smashing offensive today, a brand new wing back, and enough punch to whip a powerful Dartmouth eleven, 13 to 6, for the first and last major victory of the Sailors in the 1929 gridiron campaign.

A second year youngster named Lew Kim, 160 pounds of smash and go from Dickinson, N. J., was the leather-lugging mascot who led the hand-picked newbies of Uncle Sam out of a wilderness of defeat and ties that have engulfed the Navy record since the start of the season.

Thriving on the coldest November 20 Philadelphia has experienced since 1880. This 19-year-old boy, one of the "97" sound marching partners for the first time until two weeks ago, smashed the husky Dartmouth line for two touchdowns in the second half and all but one of the points needed to win the first game Navy has ever played with the Indians from the Hanover hills of New Hampshire.

While 40,000 of the faithful braved the bitter winds that accompanied a temperature of 15 degrees of Franklin field, Navy quickly got the jump on a Dartmouth team that had been beaten previously only by Yale, and never once relinquished the upper hand.

The first half was scoreless although Navy three times had Dartmouth in trying positions.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 30.—(AP)—

A total of 14,969,822 pounds of Oregon dried prunes were loaded here for European ports during the month of November, figures released today by the Merchants' Exchange indicated.

November was also a good month for four exports with 192,421 barrels sent down the river. The money value was \$521,719.

Wheat, with 958,097 bushels worth \$1,164,216, shipped and lumber with 32,000,000 feet loaded for export showed only the average month's activities.

CHICAGO JUSTICE AFQUIL OF SNAG

CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—(AP)—

Accused members of an alleged slot machine syndicate, six of them police captives, went free today as the state for the second time in four days met unexpected collapse of an important prosecution.

The case against the defendants in the slot machine trial was postponed when it became certain that the evidence upon which the prosecutors hoped for conviction could not be presented to the jury. Their key witness, David C. Rockols, was placed on the stand three times and each time he refused to testify on the ground he might incriminate himself.

The third time the witness was prodded by the prosecution and then, on his further refusal to give evidence, was sentenced to six months in jail for contempt of court.
