

BURSTS OF BUYING FAIL AS BUOY FOR AILING STOCK LIST

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—The line of least resistance in today's stock market was again downward. Sporadic outbursts of buying took place in a selected assortment of tobacco, public utility and railway shares, but these were checked when professional selling pressure was renewed against United States Steel common and several of the other so-called pivotal industrials. Trading was relatively light in volume.

The day's business news was mixed in character. A series of increased and extra dividends by small companies was offset by reports of a further decline in steel mill operations in the mid-west to about 50 per cent of capacity and reports of a falling off in sales of some of the large automobile manufacturers.

Trailing tendencies developed in the last hour in sympathy with the buoyancy of the chemicals. Hasty short coverings temporarily erased earlier losses and the upward trend carried Columbia Carbon 2 1/2 points above the previous close. J. L. Case 9 1/2, United Fruit 3/8, Eastman Kodak, Otis Elevator, United States Freight, Worthington Pump, and A. M. Byers rose 3 to 5 points. Fox Film recovered 5 points of its earlier loss of 6 1/2. Selling broke out again in the final dealings and the close was irregular. Sales approximated 2,800,000 shares.

GREEN PEAS FINDING WAY PORTLAND MART

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 2.—For those who still yearn for fresh vegetables of the summer season variety green peas are coming in from the productive coast section. A leading produce company reports regular receipts of these. They sell at 12c a pound wholesale and are packed in 49 and 69 pound sacks.

Cucumbers from the Eugene district were selling at \$1.75 to \$2.25 a dozen. Hollows, tomatoes at 20¢ to 25¢ a pound. The California fresh tomato is held at 33¢ to 35¢ a box.

Butter and egg prices were unchanged, with a still weaker tendency in eggs.
