

CRESCENT CITY S.F. SPORTSMAN DATA GIVEN TO PURCHASES SITE CONGRESSMEN ON ROGUE RIVER

Report On Harbor As Submitted to Army Official Is Sent to Washington—\$50,000 Improvement Is Recommended By Army Engineer.

Frank B. Madison, Prominent San Francisco Lawyer Buys 100 Acres On Rogue River—Will Build Handsome Residence and Lodge in Spring.

Copies of the data and information submitted to Maj. E. H. Ropes, district engineer, corps of U. S. engineers, at a recent hearing held in Crescent City have been sent to the congressional delegations of Oregon and California, also to members of the senate commerce committee, urging that the report be brought to the immediate attention of the board of army engineers, according to officials of the Northern California-Southern Oregon Development association.

The hearing was the outcome of an authorization by the senate commerce committee for the army engineers to make a further survey of Crescent City harbor. The 12-page report was prepared by the development association for the Del Norte county board of supervisors. In sending the reports the association requested the senators and representatives to urge that it be presented to the board of army engineers for review without delay.

Gates' Statement

C. F. Gates, president of the development association, made the following statement with regard to the breakwater in its present form:

"The board of directors of our association feels that the breakwater in its present form can have little effect on outgoing tonnage, but its extension will positively be the means of developing our natural resources—timber, minerals and agriculture. Incoming tonnage is increasing rapidly and while this is very commendable, we are more anxious that larger boats shall be accommodated at Crescent City so that outgoing tonnage can also be appreciably increased.

"This is possible with an extension of the breakwater into deeper water, and the statements of those familiar with our resources, contained in the report, bear out this important fact. The government in its wisdom started the project and our hope is that its extension will be carried out without any delay whatsoever. We are working to this end realizing that the harbor is vital to the future of southern Oregon and northern California. We are anxiously waiting to hear that the board of army engineers has placed its stamp of approval on the extension to Round Rock."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—(AP)—

Appropriations amounting to \$1,217,500 for maintenance of rivers and harbors on the Oregon coast, including Crescent City and Willapa harbor, have been recommended by the chief of engineers of the army for submission to congress. The total for the United States is \$55,000,000, an increase of \$5,900,000 over last year. An additional appropriation of \$18,400 is recommended for the improvement of these rivers and harbors.

The largest improvement item in the Oregon district is the \$50,000 appropriation for Crescent City harbor, California, and the large maintenance item is \$500,000 for work on Coos Bay. The Columbia and lower Willamette rivers below Vancouver, Wash., and Portland, Ore., will get \$48,000 for improvement and \$484,000 for maintenance. An appropriation of \$100,000 for maintenance is sought for the Umpqua river. The only other improvement appropriation asked is \$20,000 for bettering Tillamook bay and bar.

coast. The acreage he purchased is near the Noyes and Burnham properties, about 18 miles from Medford. Mr. Madison also visited here the past summer with Andrew Welch of San Francisco who has a show place on the Rogue.
In the spring Mr. Madison will start the construction of a handsome residence and fishing lodge on the bluffs of the river, with a fine view of the stream, mountains and distant valleys.
The purchase price of the property was not announced.

DRY SPELL NEAR END IS FORECAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 2.—(AP)—Promise that the protracted dry spell on the Pacific coast was near an end was held forth here today by District Forecaster M. B. Summers, who predicted probable rain tonight or tomorrow in northern California and in western Oregon and Washington. The rain will probably extend southward, he said, as far as Eureka.
It could not be determined now, said Summers, how far the rain would extend inland. The forecast was for fair weather for the remainder of California.
