ARMY ENGINEERS PREPARE REPORT CRESCENT HARBOR

In order to determine whether the report on Crescent City harbor submitted to the district engineer, Major E. H. Ropes, at a hearing held in the California city on November 19th had been forwarded to Washington, D. C., C. E. Gates, president of the Northern California-Southern Oregon Development association, wired the district engineer this morning. A reply from Major Ropes would indicate that a report which he is preparing from the one given at the hearing will in all probability be sent from San Francisco within the next ten days. Officials of the development association are anxious that there be no delay in submitting the report to the board of army engineers at Washington as upon it to a certain extent a decision will be made regarding future appropriations for Crescent City harbor.

The original report was prepared by the development association for the Del Norte county board of supervisors and will no doubt be incorporated in Major Ropes' report which is to be a survey of Crescent City harbor authorized some time ago by the commerce committee of the senate.

AIRWAY BEACONS NEAR COMPLETION FOR LOCAL ROUTE

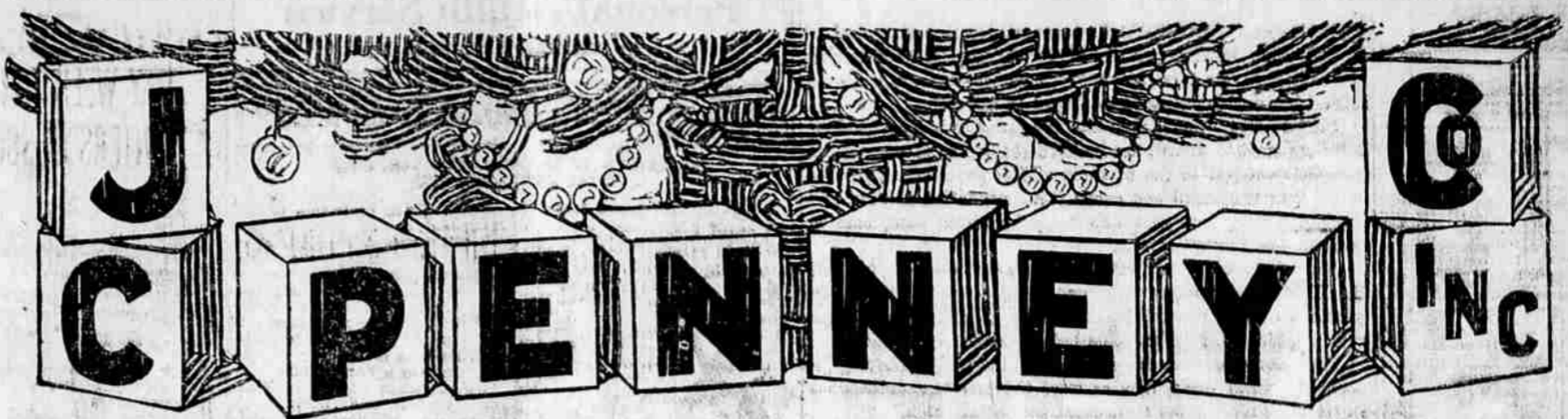
