

NO RELIEF FOR CHILLY EAST ZONE

Zero Weather Holds Sway in Middle and Northwest States — Snows, Lower Temperatures in Prospect — Far East States Traffic Is Hampered by Snow Blanket.

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—(AP) What the general public regards as zero in weather still prevailed today over the frozen plains of the middle and northwest states. From the Rockies to the Great Lakes the sway of winter was unbroken and the weather prophets, looking ahead at snows and lower temperatures in most of the western prairie states, could offer no promise of immediate relief. The lowest temperature officially reported in the United States overnight was 4 below zero at Charles City and Dubuque, Ia., LaHar, Wyo., La Crosse, Wis., and Peoria, Ill. As far south as Cincinnati the mercury touched zero. The minimum at Chicago was 1 above zero. It was 2 below at St. Paul and Duluth and similar temperatures prevailed in Indiana. Milwaukee and Ontario points reported temperatures as low as 11 below. Although rising temperatures were on the way in the lake states, farther west another drop was forecast for tonight and tomorrow.

Snow was predicted for the lake regions, Iowa and Minnesota.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—(AP) Snow, ranging in depth from several inches to more than a foot, covered eastern states today, hampering traffic and causing many accidents because of slippery roads.

In New York City, four inches of snow accompanied by sleet soon turned streets and sidewalks into a sea of slush. Traffic accidents were numerous.

LUKE JENNINGS LOSES APPEAL ON SENTENCE

In an opinion handed down by the state supreme court today Luke Jennings, former resident of the Beagle district, loses an appeal from his conviction and sentence for violation of the prohibition law. Jennings was tried before Circuit Judge H. E. Norton and was sentenced to a year in state prison and fined \$500. In a raid on Jennings' place a quantity of mash was seized. The law held this was prima facie evidence of liquor violation. Jennings maintained that the mash was used as turkey feed.

NINE FORFEIT BAIL ON DRUNK CHARGES

The city coffers were enriched today by \$150 when Chief of Police McCrobie's raid over to the city court that sum—the total sum put up with the arresting officers the past two days by nine men, which was forfeited through their failure to appear in the city court for trial, five on intoxication charges, three for possession of liquor and one for disturbing the peace. The five "drunks" who forfeited \$10 each were Ted Martin, Jack Peterson, J. Arnold, Jack Burnett and J. Haller. For possession of liquor, John Gopp forfeited \$25, Robert Stevenson \$20 and Harold Embry \$15. For disturbing the peace Eddie Kessler forfeited \$10.

WIFE NEAR DEATH AS FUNERAL HELD FOR G. P. VICTIM

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Dec. 3.—(AP) Funeral services for Robert Ingalls, Wilderville farmer, shot to death before his wife and a number of guests at a delayed wedding celebration Saturday night, were conducted today while Josephine county district attorney prepared to charge Anthony Varga 17, high school boy, with first degree murder. Mrs. Ingalls was in a hospital here hovering between life and death. When informed that a coroner's jury last night had declared Ingalls' death the result of "gunshot wounds in the hands of a person or persons unknown to the jury" but that W. T. Miller, district attorney, was preparing to charge him with the crime, Varga remained silent in jail. Forty guests testified at the inquest last night. Ingalls is alleged to have been shot down by Varga when he was ordered from the home.

CRATER WEATHER CLEAR AND WARM

That the weather at Crater national park is warmer than in the valley—or at least was last Sunday, described as a perfect day, with wonderful clearness, like in August—is the news brought back by Bill Godfrey, chief ranger of the park, who returned to the city Sunday night; also that 330 persons in 94 cars visited the lake Sunday. "No snow is in sight, but the roads are icy in places and chains should be worn by cars of all visitors. The visibility is so good that a perfect view of Mt. Shasta is obtained. It is snowless, too. Travel to the lake, which long ago broke all records, since the closing of the season, September 20, will continue until heavy rains and deep snows come. In all last month 4965 persons in 1553 cars visited Crater lake, including cars from 28 states and two foreign countries, Germany and Canada. California had 713 persons and 339 cars, and Oregon had 3557 persons and 1222 cars. So far, for the travel year of 1930, which began October 1, last, there is an increase of 81 per cent over the same period of last year. Since June 22, when the park was opened to travel, to last Monday a total of 136,214 persons visited Crater Lake.
