## ASHLAND WOMAN AMONG BELOVED FIRST RESIDENTS

It is with deep regret that we note the passing of each member of our old pioneer contingent, but, after enduring the hardship of pioneer life, it is a sweet solace to those who survive that the later pioneers who passed away enjoyed the luxuries which modern existence makes possible.

One of the most beloved of Jackson county's older citizens was Mrs. Almada Nichols Carlton who breathed her last at her home on Union street in Ashland at 10:30 o'clock last Sunday evening and who will be interred in the Mountain View cemetery at Ashland tomorrow, Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Mrs. Carlton was a daughter of John Meade Nichols and Mercy Anne Nichols, pioneers of 1833 who crossed the plains in ox wagons, settling first in the Willamette valley, but removing to Jackson county prior to 1856. Deceased was born on the 13th day of October, 1856 at the family home south of Eagle Point, and was married on the tenth day of December, 1875 to S. A. Carlton, familiarly known to all pioneers as "Dolph" Carlton, and until their family of six children were almost grown, they resided continuously at the family home, on what is now known as Broadmoor farm, known formerly as the Luzerne Bradley tract, title to which passed from the entryman direct to Mrs. Carlton's father.

The surviving children are J. H. Carlton of Ashland; Thomas and Herbert Carlton of Prospect and Lyle Carlton of Eagle Point. There are nine grand-children and two great-grand-children and one brother, G. W. Nichols of this city, the only survivor of six children of the older pioneer John Meade Nichols. W. M. TOLMES.

## GEORGE LEONARD FAMILY HERE TO GREET HOME KIN

There was the kind of laughter that verges on tears in the eyes of a father and mother this morning—Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Leonard, pioneer residents of Medford—who greeted their son, George, after five years of separation—his pretty young wife, whom they had never seen before, and their two golden-haired, cherub-faced grandsons, born in Paris four and three years ago, respectively. This party, accompanied by Miss Margaret Snider, sister of Mrs. George Leonard, from New York, arrived on the Shasta this noon for a short visit here through the holidays.

George Leonard, who graduated from the Medford high school in 1916 and from West Point in 1924, met his wife in New York several years ago. A commercial art student, she left the year of his graduation to study in Paris and to do illustrations for French and American magazines. George followed her to the French capital, where they were married and have made their home ever since.

Talented as a writer, the Medford boy contributed articles to a number of magazines abroad, and for a time edited his own publication, "Unconventional," for which Mrs. Leonard did illustrations. He is at the present time writing for both American and French magazines, two of his works being recently included in the "Golden Book."

Living in a villa at Barbizon, a short distance from Paris, the Leonards are happily situated in a famous artists' colony, where dwell many of the immortal authors and bards of generations ago.

Although happy to be here for a visit with relatives, they both express a preference for sunny France as a permanent dwelling place. While on their vacation they will visit Mrs. Leonard's family in Seattle. At just which of the two places they will spend Christmas is as yet an uncertainty, they said.

This latest innovation in the world of crime consist of a Hwo Wei lottery, a favorite gambling pastime of the Chinese, on wheels with a travelling staff on bicycles who assist gamblers in investing their money.

Driven out of the international settlement, the proprietors of lottery establishments were at their wits' end, and a prominent anti-gambling crusade inaugurated by the police of Shanghai several months ago, when the fast motor truck accompanied by outriders was hit upon as the solution. The truck brings gambling to outdoor. Mr. and Mrs. Sun Hoo-too, the Wangs and the Fung-line crowd around, invest on their favorite number and go back to their homes.
