

FRED'K GILLETT DEAN OF SENATE NOT CANDIDATE

Scan Massachusetts Republican Ranks for Successor — 39 Years of Service Praised— 50 Years in Public Office.

BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 3.—(AP)—Agitation in Massachusetts Republican ranks over Senator Frederick H. Gillett's decision not to run again was mingled today with praise for his services to state and nation.

In a statement at Washington, Senator Gillett, who is 78 years old, revealed that he had resolved to retire at the end of the six-year term when he was elected in 1924. His withdrawal on March 4, 1931, will end 39 years' continuous congressional service, the longest of any man living since the recent death of Senator Warren of Wyoming, and a record of public office which began 50 years ago as an assistant attorney general of the state.

Governor Frank C. Allen said that the senator had rendered "distinguished service to the state and nation."

Eben S. Draper, former state senator, was the first in the field as a possible successor.

Former President Coolidge has said with emphasis that he has no desire to sit in the senate.

D. Loring Young, candidate defeated by David I. Walsh, Democrat, by 60,000 votes last fall, definitely took himself out of the alignment.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Reports that the native 59th Nonre Rogers, Republican of Massachusetts, would enter the Massachusetts senatorial race next year for the seat from which Senator Gillett, Republican, plans to retire, today prompted a statement that she was "too busy in my present work to give it consideration at this time."

TAXES DUE FROM OREGON COUNTIES

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 3.—(AP)—The state treasurer's office said today that \$221,947.01 remains unpaid of the second-half of state taxes due from Oregon counties last Saturday night. The total amount due is \$2,824,291.23 and \$2,502,343.25 has been paid.

Counties that have paid no part of their second-half taxes and the amounts due from each are: Deschutes, \$31,815.84; Klamath, \$8,474.55; Tillamook, \$54,652.86; Umatilla, \$117,052.75; Wheeler, \$11,740.25.

World War Vet, Lost 13 Years, Is Home Again

BREAD ON THE WATERS

PALO ALTO, Cal.—Once two American schoolboys were working their way through Leland Stanford university.

They were terribly hard up and did not know where to get food and college fees. They did not mind what they did or how they worked so long as they could find means to get through the term somehow.

One day they had what might be called a bright idea. Paderewski was in the neighborhood. Suppose they arranged a concert in the district and tried to make something out of it? Full of hope, they set to work.

They worked very hard indeed to arrange the concert. When it was over they found that instead of having money to spare they could only raise \$1600 for Paderewski. After that there were expenses to pay.

They went to Paderewski, told him the story, and gave him the \$1600 with a promissory note for the rest. By hook or by crook, they said, they would earn the money and send it to him as soon as they had got it.

"And what about your college fees?" said Paderewski. "No, this will not do." He took up the promissory note and gave them back the \$1600, telling them to pay their concert expenses, take 10 per cent each of the balance and send the rest to him.

The boys, intensely thankful, did as Paderewski said, and went on with their education. They grew up. The great pianist was heard of from time to time. He forgot all about them, of course, but they did not forget about him.

A generation passed; the Great War came. Paderewski stopped playing and tried to find food for starving Poland. The land Paderewski was in, then, Poland, was in a terrible way. Apart from that, you were once very kind to me when I was a college lad, and I have not forgotten."—Christian Science Monitor.

PORTLAND FIRES INDISCREET COP

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 2.—(AP)—Lieutenant William Breuning's 15 years of service on Portland's police force ended today with his discharge by Mayor Baker at the conclusion of a hearing at which Mrs. Anna Schrader told of an eight-year love affair with the policeman.

Breuning denied improper relations with the woman, declaring he loved her only "like a sister." Mayor Baker, after declaring he believed Breuning had been "indiscreet," and contending that "the police department must have the respect of the community," said "All officers who accept the responsibility of enforcing the law and maintaining the morale have got to deny themselves systerly love where husband and wife are not thoroughly in accord with it."

ALBERTA FARMER NEW WHEAT KING

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—(AP)—A wheat grower from the foothills of the Canadian Rockies, Joseph H. E. Smith, was selected as the wheat king of the National Hay and Grain show today. Smith, whose home is at Wolf Creek, Alberta, won the title with his sample of hard red spring wheat, which weighed 63.3 pounds to the bushel.

The Canadian triumphed over another Smith, C. Edson Smith of Corvallis, Montana, who had held the championship for the last two years. The Montanan exhibited a slightly heavier sample than the Canadian, but the judges decided the uniformity and color of the new wheat king's exhibit deserved the premier honors.

WEST POINT, N. Y., Dec. 3.—(AP) In the first published interview permitted a West Point undergraduate in more than 100 years, Alonzo Parham, negro cadet, today spoke rumors that he had been ostracized at the military academy.

Shanghai Holds Foreigners In Strict Concession Limit; White Enterprise Undesired

SHANGHAI.—(AP) War on what the Chinese authorities call "encroachments of foreigners" has reached unusual proportions, especially in Shanghai, the center of most of the trouble. A week seldom passes but that some new order appears, designed to limit the activities of Americans, British and all other nationals, whose governments have not given up their extra-territorial privileges.

The Chinese responsible for these restrictions freely acknowledge that the purpose is to curtail foreign enterprise outside the boundaries of the international settlement and the French concession. Within two months three such orders have been issued. The first, and probably most important, prohibits Chinese residents of the native city from selling land to either the International Settlement municipal council or to individual foreigners. The move was taken, the order explained, to stop Settlement authorities from building motor roads outside their own territory.

For many years, the Settlement municipal council has constructed these outside roads. Enormous sums have been spent on them and the Chinese have benefited as well as the foreigners. The fact that they have been built, however, caused many protests from Chinese and the recent action to halt further construction has followed.

Chinese who violate the order will be severely punished. All property figuring in transactions outside the Settlement will be confiscated and both seller and buyer will lose.

The second of the recent orders was issued by the Kiangsu Provincial government, of which Shanghai is the capital. This prohibited the Henli regatta, the big boating event of the season. For a dozen years, the Shanghai Rowing club has held two regattas annually.
