

MAJORS DIVIDE ALL STAR HONOR IN SCRIBE VOTE

Each League Places Five Men On Mythical Baseball Lineup — Mickey Cochrane Is Unanimous Choice Catching Position

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The two major leagues in baseball shared honors equally in the 1929 all-star team of the Sporting News, St. Louis baseball newspaper, named by the vote of 187 members of the Baseball Writers' association, and announced today.

Each league placed five men on the team, which includes two pitchers and one player for each of the other positions. An outstanding feature was the unanimous selection by the scribes of Mickey Cochrane of the world champion Philadelphia Athletics for the catching position. He received all 187 votes. Three of his teammates also were chosen.

Members of the team are: Al Simmons, Athletics, left field; Hank Wilson, Chicago Cubs, center field; Babe Ruth, New York Yankees, right field; Jimmy Foxx, Philadelphia Athletics, first base; Rogers Hornsby, Chicago Cubs, second base; Pie Traynor, Pittsburgh Pirates, third base; Travis Jackson, New York Giants, shortstop; Mickey Cochrane, Athletics, catcher; Left Grove, Athletics, pitcher; Buzleigh Grimes, Pittsburgh Pirates, pitcher.

The team has a batting average of .327, and if the pitchers are included, the average is .345. The two pitchers have won a total of 37 games while losing 13, for an average of .740 for the season.

Seven players were chosen by overwhelming vote. The race for first base was close between Foxx and Bill Terry of the Giants. Grimes was closely pressed by George Barnshaw of the Athletics for second pitching position, and Hank Wilson had competition for the center garden position.

The Sporting News has sponsored selection of the team for five years, and Hornsby is the only player to be named on all five teams.

Christner looked fairly good in the first three easy-going stanzas, but in the fourth, Kennedy opened up with a left to the Akron fighter's nose and followed it with blows to the body and head which left Christner on the run. In the sixth Kennedy planted another one on Christner's nose, and in the seventh crashed in five more of the same variety. The Long Beach boy led the fighting all the way, and after the third round the Ohio brawler spent most of his time attempting to dodge Kennedy's attack.

SON PLAYS HALFBACK ON FATHER'S ELEVEN

VETERAN GRID OFFICIAL ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT

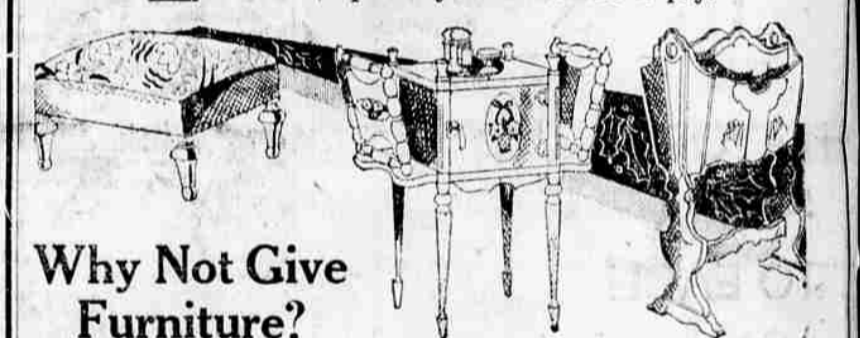
