

WILL MOVE DOG POUND FROM CITY

Council and Humane Society Agree On Site at Fairgrounds for Plant—Extension of South Central Avenue Ordered—Work Starts Early in January.

It developed at the city council meeting last night that the Humane society's buildings and runways for the shelter of stray and impounded dogs, horses and cattle will be located on the two acres at the eastern edge of the county fair grounds, along with a dwelling for the humane society superintendent, on the site formerly occupied by the Pacific Air Transport company. The city government will probably give the society a limited lease on this two acres, and it is understood the county will also co-operate to give the society a first-class plant.

In discussing this matter with Mrs. H. D. McCaskey and Mr. and Mrs. Sid Richardson of the humane society, the council passed ordinances for the extension of South Central avenue to the Pacific highway, and for the purchase of a strip of land thru the June Earhart property to enable this purpose to be carried out, decided to centralize all purchases over \$5 for city departments under one head, City Superintendent Fred Scheffel; authorized the city council airport committee to build a \$2500 bungalow at the airport for the use of the airport superintendent, who must be at the airport practically all the time; discussed complaints about the odors arising from the city garbage dump and also decided a number of routine matters.

Start Next Month.
The next step in the matter of extending South Central avenue through the Earhart property to Riverside avenue, for which improvement over 65 per cent of the property owners benefitted had signed, will be the spreading of the assessment, etc. The actual work on the improvement will not be begun until the first of next month.

The centralized purchase plan, which will be inaugurated at once is indirectly attributable to the recent criticisms of the citizens budget committee in the direction of economy, and a little friendly tilt between Mayor A. W. Pipes and Councilman Buchter on the finance committee having recommended in its budget report that each city department keep well within its budget next year by exercising rigid economy. The city officials, however had often informally discussed the centralized purchasing idea, but the matter was never brought to a head until last night when Mr. Buchter, with Mayor Pipes' hearty approval, brought up the subject and made a motion that all purchases over \$5 by the heads of the various departments and even chairmen of council committees in charge of these departments, be made through City Superintendent Scheffel.

Delegation Present.
The Humane Society delegation visited the council last night in effort to obtain definite assurance at once that the council would lease the two acres wanted on the fair grounds, which are owned by the city. As soon as this assurance is given, and the outlook is that it will be, as soon as the matter is further investigated by a special committee to which the matter was referred, all the city officials being in favor of it, the humane society is ready to at once begin the work of building its plant on the fairgrounds.

Sid Richardson briefly outlined the society's plans and stated that the society's check for the purchase of the former buildings of the Pacific Air Transport company is in the hands of the company and word was expected any time now as to whether this deal will go through. Even if it does not the society is ready to start building at once, awaiting only the council's assurance of the site.

The fairgrounds site is an ideal one for the humane society plant, he said, because of its easy accessibility to the public, and yet being so isolated as not to bother any one. It is off the fairgrounds proper, and would not interfere in any way with that amusement center.

Time Limit Fought.
Councilman Grey, who is not antagonistic in any way to allowing the society to use the two acres, unless it would interfere with future plans to beautify Bear creek, said that a limited time should be put on this use with the proviso that if in the future the city should find need to take back the property it could do so by reimbursing the humane society for any building expense it might have been put to.

Mr. Grey declared that the council should not take any action which would tie the hands of future city councils. The mayor and other councilmen also felt the same way, and hence the matter of time of lease was referred to a special committee to investi-

gate, and reach an agreement with the humane society.

The complained of odors by residents of Vancouver avenue, arising from the dump of the garbage company at the south-eastern limits of the city, and as to what could be done to remedy this evil, after discussion, was referred to the park and public works committee. It was generally agreed by the councilmen that the main offensive odor arises from the hog pens and runways at the dump, which Councilman Wing described as indescribably filthy. City Superintendent Scheffel said that the garbage company now was building new pens and quarters for the hogs, and when this work was finished much of the odor would be done away with.

Dr. L. D. Inskeep, city health officer, recommended that the city council take steps to furnish various take-ups in the city with proper sewer facilities, which are lacking now. The matter was taken under advisement.

OWEN OREGON TO KEEP STEP WITH HOOVER

James H. Owen, general manager of the Owen-Oregon Lumber company returned yesterday from a nine day trip through the middle west, where he attended the annual meeting of the Owen-Oregon company directors, at East Claire, Wis., and announced that his recommendations and reports on local mill improvements and the proposed Owen-Oregon railroad from Butte Falls to a point near the Klamath county line, had been deferred to a later date for consideration.

He said the general policy of the company would be "to keep step with President Hoover's plan for the maintenance of prosperity," and "that nothing gives the west such a black eye in the mind of foreigners, as exaggerated reports of forest fires."

"I have received letters from friends hoping I would not get burned up in a forest fire," he said. "Their concern is due to the fact that a fire is burning on a small portion of our timber holdings, and it is doing more good than harm." He further stated that he had learned from railroad officials that reports of forest fires, in the east, yearly resulted in the cancellation of railroad reservations for tourist trips through the west. He favored press reports of forest fires of consequence "without the headlines being 'bigger than the fires'."

General Manager Owen reported that on his trip he heard many favorable reports on the Rose campaign of the Winter Pear committee in Detroit and that his company had completed arrangements for the distribution of 200 boxes of Medford Rose and Connie pears to customers and friends throughout the land, at Christmas time. This is an annual custom of the lumber company.

"I found money 'easier' in the middle west, and a lot in all lines of activities," said Mr. Owen, "and a disposition on the part of business and industry to do their share towards the maintenance of prosperity, as outlined by the president, and that the federal government should spend more of the surplus in the treasury for the carrying on of public work, without any dilapidating by congress."

He said that the lumber business generally was at its lowest ebb in many years, but with a willingness on the part of the mill owners to do their share, the real extensive federal work was the key to the situation, and the awakening of industry.

During his trip Mr. Owen caught a cold, which kept him in his room in San Francisco, when he planned on attending the Oregon-St. Mary's football game Thanksgiving Day. He still has the cold.

COURT ORDERS EMIGRANT DAM ROUTE SURVEY

Road to Open Up 2000 Acres of Farming Land Will Be Located—Delegation in Hot Discussion of Route Proposals.

A preliminary survey for a county road from the Emigrant dam to the Pacific highway was ordered by the county court this morning, following a meeting with a large delegation. The road would open up approximately 2000 acres of farming land and give an outlet to a score of families.

The session waxed warm on a couple of occasions. A woman member of the petitioning body charged that the "county court paid no attention to any of them." County Judge Alex Sparrow replied that "you women invited the court to come up and see the road route and eat a chicken dinner. The court went, and was unable to find the chicken dinner or any of you women."

The county court instructed the county engineer to make a preliminary survey, and announced that "once the road was definitely decided upon, it would make no difference who objects, that is the way it will go."

The county court told the delegation that the county court and your neighbors want to see you get the road, but nobody ever built a road that pleased everybody.

Attorney George M. Roberts, appearing for Butler Walker, a land owner of the district, said that "if the road is built on the lines proposed in the petition it would be joined." He further stated that any legal action would be "easily, disadvantageous, foolish and unwise." He pointed out that the petition would not hold legal water, as it did not state the terms of said road.

The petition, signed by 112 out of 119 residents of the district, asked that the road be built from a point on the Pacific highway near the Holmes and Dunn farms, and extend to a point on the Klamath Ashland highway near the T. A. Elliott place. The court ruled a road of this length was too costly for consideration at this time, and that it could not be built beyond the Emigrant dam.

Danger Seen.
The county court also said that it was opposed to the creation of any more openings on the Pacific highway, as "they constitute an other danger zone," and they would have to use one of the present roads into Ashland.

The court further said that, with the cooperation of the city of Ashland, they hoped to establish a market road running between the Dead Indian road and Mountain View avenue, which would open new territory and provide an outlet.

J. C. Thompson of the California Oregon Power company told the court that the construction of a road up Emigrant creek would enable the company to serve the residents of the south end of the

county more effectively and that "the present means of communication are horrible," and had resulted in some curtailment of service.

Woman Wants Road.
C. Vroman, a farmer of the section, told the court: "You can build the road over the top of my house and through the middle of the place, as long as we get the road." Olin Arnsperger, manager of the Talent irrigation district, said that the road was feasible and necessary.

Mrs. C. A. Tucker and A. R. Kincaid were spokesmen for the delegation and Commissioner George Afford outlined the best and quickest methods for getting the action. Other speakers said that the road would eliminate the hardships now endured by children in getting to and from school.

There is a marked improvement over the financial situation as estimated in the budget for 1930, and transmitted to congress in December, 1928, he said. "Compared with the estimate of one year ago receipts show an increase of about \$168,000,000 and the expenditures about \$243,000,000. On the receipt side the increase in the estimate is reflected generally in the incomes reported by individuals for 1928 and to this exceedingly prosperous business year."

"With an estimated surplus of over \$225,000,000 this year and \$122,000,000 next year it is felt that some measure of reduction in taxes is justified. Since the fiscal year 1921 four tax reductions have been made. Experience has shown that each reduction in taxes has resulted in revenue in excess of the mathematically computed return under the reduced rates."

Aid to Business.
"Undoubtedly an increase in the prosperity of business brought forth by tax reduction is partly responsible for this experience. Such reduction gives the taxpayer correspondingly more for his own
