NEPHEW OF MORGAN IN DEATH PACT

Henry Grew Crosby, Poet, and Josephine Rotch Bigelow, Bride of Graduate Student at Harvard Found Dead New York Studio—Suicide Agreement Is Police View.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—(AP)—Henry Grew Crosby, 32, and Mrs. Josephine Rotch Bigelow, 22, a bride, both socially prominent in Boston, were found shot to death in an artist's studio in West 67th street last night in what police believe was a suicide pact.

The bodies, fully clothed, were found facing each other on a bed. Crosby's left arm was about the woman's neck and in his right hand was a .25-caliber pistol. Mrs. Bigelow was shot in the left temple and Crosby in the right.

There were no notes, and while the police were convinced the couple died in a suicide pact, they were at a loss to ascribe a motive.

Crosby had been registered since November 28 at the Savoy Plaza hotel with his wife, the former Mrs. Mary Jacob Peabody of New York, whom he married in 1922, and his mother, Mrs. S. V. R. Crosby. He was the son of Stephen van Rensselaer Crosby, Boston banker and a war veteran and a graduate of Harvard. He recently had returned from Paris. He was a nephew of J. P. Morgan.

Was June Bride.
Mrs. Bigelow had been visiting friends in New York the last two weeks. She was married last June to Albert S. Bigelow, now a graduate student at Harvard and a former Harvard hockey player.

The studio at the Hotel de Artistes, in which the shooting occurred was that of Stanley Mortimer, Jr., who said he had met Crosby in a Paris Cafe five years ago, and that Crosby sometimes used his apartment when in New York. He described Crosby as a poet.

He said that Crosby phoned him yesterday afternoon asking for use of the apartment and that he had given his consent. Crosby arrived with Mrs. Bigelow shortly afterward. When Mortimer returned about 9:15 last night, he found the door locked and bolted and receiving no answer to his ringing, notified the superintendent, who forced an entrance. The bodies were then found.

Find Radiogram.
In Crosby's pocket the police found a wallet containing \$523.75, a visiting card reading, "Harry Crosby, 19 Rue de Lillie, Paris," and a radiogram addressed to him aboard the ship "Mauretania" and dated Nov. 18. It read:

"Cable George when you arrive and where I can telephone you immediately. Am impatient. (Signed) 'Josephine.'"

Crosby's mother is the former Henrietta M. Grew, a sister of the late Mrs. J. Pierpont Morgan. At the time of his marriage, Crosby was engaged in the banking business. His wife had been ill forced in February, 1922, from the city of New York, of Dutchess county, New York, and has two children by her first marriage.

Shortly after their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Crosby went to Paris where they subsequently made their home. They were the proprietors of the Black Sun press on Rue Cardinale, Paris, which has published works by James Joyce and Eugene Ionesco, who was an associate of Crosby on the staff of "Transition," described as "an international quarterly for creative experiment."

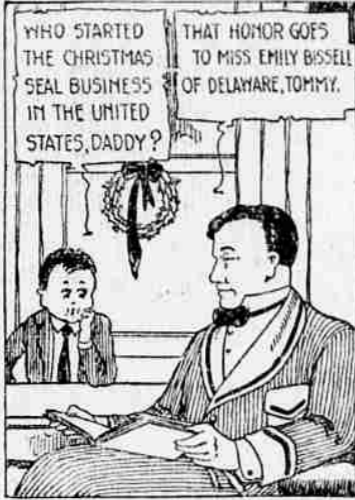
Stars Suffocated.
Crosby, who had an independent income, at one time explained he made his home in Paris because "in America the stars are all suffocated inside," and because he preferred "Perihelion to Apollon."

Among other reasons he gave were that "by living outside of America, New York can still remain for me the city of a thousand and one nights," and that "rivers of suicide are more inviting than the prairies of prosperity."

Mortimer, in whose apartment the shooting took place, is a portrait painter a Princeton graduate and a member of the exclusive clubs in New York.

GREENSPRING ROAD IN DANGEROUS CONDITION

The Ashland-Klamath Falls highway through the Greenspring Mountain section is in a dangerous condition, according to local men who crossed over the mountain highway last night after the all-day rain, says the Ashland Tribune.

The construction work on the highway is only partially done and there is a considerable distance where travel is made over clay bottom—a good, hard but dusty surface in the summer time and a slippery, dangerous, sticky mud in the winter season.

Local men said there were three cars in the ditch along the stretch of muddy highway and they found their car crossings in the road several times in spite of careful driving. Unless they get a crush stone or gravel surface on that road within a short time the highway will be impassable, one man remarked.

NEGRO COUPLE HELD IN DEATH OF DRY RAIDER

Oklahoma Officials Move for Quick Justice in Slaying of Agent During Search for Whiskey—Woman Wields Gun.

CUSHING, Okla., Dec. 11.—(AP) County officials were prepared to act swiftly today against John Young, negro, and his wife, accused of slaying Otto Butler, prohibition agent of Enid, and wounding George Danhour, another federal agent in a liquor raid in the negro section here last night.

M. J. Bradley, Payne county sheriff, said murder charges would be filed against both Young and his wife today at Stillwater, and other officials indicated plans already had been made to put the case before the courts speedily.

Butler and Danhour, accompanied by Dave Humphrey, deputy sheriff, went to Young's home last night. Humphrey, fearing he might be recognized, left the house and soon after his departure, Danhour said, the federal agents asked for a pint of whiskey.

When the negro produced the liquor, Danhour continued, he was served with a warrant for his arrest. Young, he said, snatched at the bottle, in an effort to destroy it, and during the scuffle between Danhour and the negro, Butler entered another room, where he found Mrs. Young.

Butler Shot.
Butler said he heard a shot and a moment later Butler fell to the floor near the doorway, where he died almost instantly.

Young also fired, Danhour said, and the federal man fell to his knees, with a bullet through his side. After he had been shot, Danhour said, he attempted to draw his own gun but the woman came to the door of the room and fired at him, wounding him in the shoulder.

Police officers, hearing the firing entered the house and arrested the negro and his wife. Danhour was rushed to a hospital where it was said that, although his condition was serious, he probably would recover.

Portland Wrangle Over New Ordinance Is Climaxed By Blow in Council Chamber—Dunne Quits As Factional Leader.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 11.—(AP) A sound smack on the face of G. J. McPherson, secretary of the Retail Merchants' and Grocers' association, administered by Joseph E. Dunne, state senator, climaxed an hour's wrangling over Portland's new milk law and brought about the abdication of Dunne as leader of the raw milk faction.

The quarrel last night between Dunne and McPherson came immediately after Dunne threatened to tie the ordinance up in court for 18 months unless the group he represented is allowed to make some changes in the law.

"It is a piece of political trickery," McPherson declared. "If there is anybody engaged in political trickery, it is you," roared Dunne advancing across the floor of the city council chamber.

A few more words followed and Dunne's smack on McPherson's face echoed through the room. Dr. R. L. Benson, city bacteriologist, then took up the quarrel and challenged Dunne. "Hit me, you coward," Benson roared, but others present succeeded in quieting the row.
