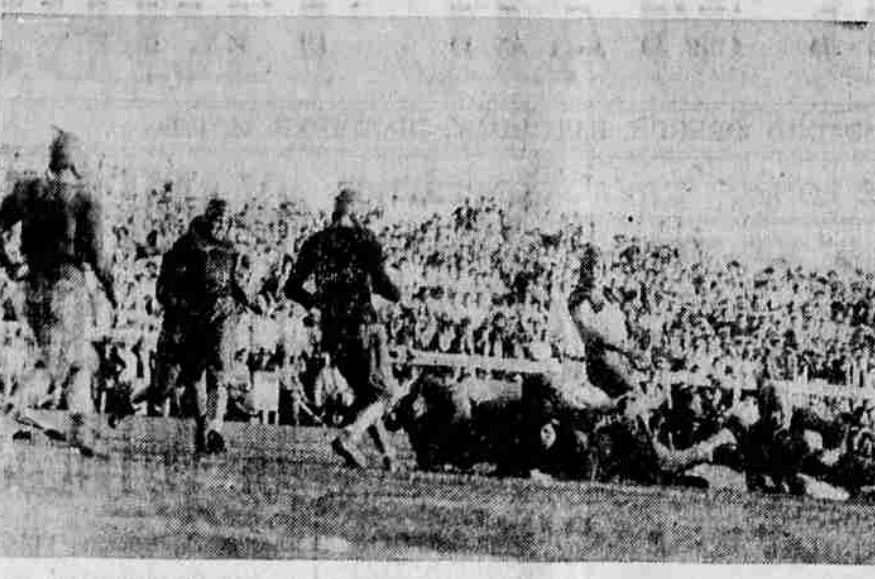

HOPE WANES IN HUNT FOR TWO LOST IN WOODS

VANCOUVER, Wash., Dec. 14.—(AP)—Hopes that R. H. Dehn, 27, and E. G. Scarberg, 40, St. Helens, Ore., business men, would be found alive, waned today as more than 20 men searched the snow-covered wilderness of Clark county, where Dehn and Scarberg have been missing since Sunday.

Further complications developed when it was reported that a party of seven men who left St. Helens to search for the missing pair, had been lost two days in the brush. They were to have met a searching party from Vancouver, but Deputy Sheriff Charles Thurman said he had heard nothing from them.

Grappling hooks were employed in the rapid and swollen Skousson river yesterday, after searchers expressed fear that Dehn and Scarberg became lost during a blizzard in the highlands and fell from a cliff into the river. They were in the mountains inspecting a mining claim.

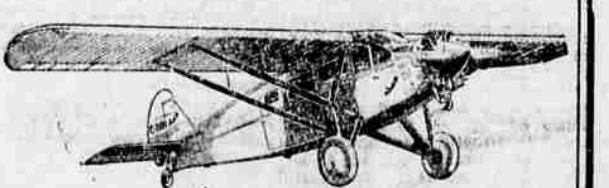
