

FLOREY DEAD AS RESULT OF AUTO CRASH INJURIES

Andrew J. Florey, well known Eagle Point resident, died yesterday afternoon at the Community hospital as the result of injuries sustained in an auto crash Friday night on the Crater-Lake highway. He had not regained consciousness since the accident, which occurred when a car driven by George Holmes of Eagle Point collided with one driven by W. D. Oliver of Trail near the Trail postoffice.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow forenoon at 10:30 at the Conger Funeral Parlor. Interment will be made in the Central Point cemetery. Services will be conducted by Rev. Carmen E. Mell.

He was born 28 years ago at Eagle Point and spent all of his life in Jackson county. He served in the World war and was the first to enlist from the Eagle Point section.

He leaves his wife, Ethel Florey, and two children, Jackie and Phyllis, seven and four years old, respectively. He is also survived by three brothers and two sisters, Floyd Hoffman of Longview, Wash., Margaret Reter, Clatsop County, Ore., and Judge Florey of Medford.

JACKSON CO. HAS 67 STUDENTS IN STATE COLLEGE

Thirty-Nine From Medford—Commerce Claims Major Interest—Scholastic Honors and Campus Won By Many Local Students.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Dec. 14.—(Spt.)—Thirty-nine out of the 2400 students enrolled at Oregon State college this term list Medford as their home, according to a report issued today by the college registrar. Jackson county sends 67 students.

FEAR NO FLOOD ACCOUNT RAINS MEDFORD AREA

Up to 3 a. m. today, since September 1st last 6.38 inches of rain had fallen in Medford and immediate vicinity, the vast majority during the rainy spell which began a week ago last Saturday night. Unsettled weather with probable rain is forecast for tonight and Tuesday.

There were downpours at times Saturday night, yesterday and last night. The precipitation amounted to 1.4 of an inch up to 12 m. Sunday, and between the latter hour and 3 a. m. today .11 of an inch more fell.

All this rain did no damage, but did flood the curbs of several streets, increased the small lakes in the low lying places and much increased the water depth of the Rooster river, Bear creek and other streams of the valley.

So far the great amount of moisture that has fallen since Saturday night a week ago has been absorbed by the thirsty ground which had long been in need of it, because of the lengthy preceding drought, but today it was generally deemed that the soil had absorbed its surface all it could at present, and that further heavy rain within the next day or so would run off the ground into the streams and raise the latter to the level of their banks, at least.

However, there is no danger probably of a Blue Creek flood in the city like two or more years ago, due to the fact that for a week or two the water of the city laborer, which City Superintendent Fred Schettel had at work clearing the channel of Bear creek between Portland avenue and several hundred feet this side of the Jackson street bridge of obstructions, cutting away of willows in the channel and along the sides of the creek banks. This work was just completed Saturday.

No Damage From Flood.
Despite of this Superintendent Schettel said this week had no doubt that these could be another flood now like preceding ones. He also said that the heavy rainfall had done no damage so far to the city's storm drains and general drainage system, although growth taking them sometimes.

Bear creek was still well within its banks today as was the river, although the latter has greatly risen and was supposed to have yesterday afternoon to be rising this at a 1904 rate hour.
