

WEST POINTERS OFF FOR COAST TO PLAY CARDS

Army Gridmen Travel De Luxe for Game at Palo Alto On 28th—First Stop at Galesburg for Practice Workout Today.

WEST POINT, N. Y., Dec. 19.—(AP)—The Army football squad, 110 strong, was enroute today on the longest trip ever taken by the gridiron warriors of the military academy. They are due to reach Galesburg, Ill., this afternoon on the first leg of the trip to Palo Alto, Calif., where they will encounter Stanford in the final game of the season, December 28.

The departure of the "West Point special," a 12-car train which provides every possible comfort for a traveling football team, was made a ceremonial occasion yesterday when the academy superintendent, Major General W. R. Smith gave permission for the cadets to give final vocal encouragement to the departing squad. General Smith previously had ruled that the cadets could not be present at the departure on account of examinations, but he relaxed the ruling to permit 500 who were free most of the afternoon to be present.

The arrival of the train at Galesburg this afternoon will be another important occasion. The players, officials and others who bring the party to a total of 140 members, are to be the guests of the city.

KID CHOCOLATE

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—(AP) Kid Chocolate, dusky Cuban featherweight, now can go back home for Christmas with the knowledge that he has met and overcome his strongest opponent since he disposed of Al Singer last spring. The Cuban kept most of the stiff opposition from Dominic Petrone of New York, the biggest and toughest opponent he has encountered in some time last night.

Petrone, with a three-pound weight advantage and a couple of inches in reach, battled Chocolate to a standstill through the first two or three rounds of their ten round battle at the Coliseum last night but wilted under the keed's merciless hammering and escaped a knockout by a slim margin. In the closing rounds Chocolate hit him almost as he pleased, then stood back and dared Petrone to try to hit him.

O'GRADY WILL BOX FELDMAN FRIDAY IN SPECIAL BOUT

Medford and southern Oregon boxing fans will see Gene O'Grady, old southern Oregon favorite, in action tomorrow night at the armory, when he meets Willie Feldman of New York City in a short main event of four rounds. Feldman was to have met Ray Pelkey of Oakland, Calif., but a severe cut over Pelkey's eye made his appearance here impossible. The boys will fight fast rounds and are not going into the match with any thought in mind of just putting on an exhibition.

Promoter Joe Bickerstaff managed to obtain the consent of Bernie Burnett, O'Grady's manager, to meet Feldman in Medford. The promoter declares that while the two men had been in training together, they are out to fight four of the most active rounds ever seen here.

There will be five red hot fights on the bill, featuring two mammoth, K. O. McCumber of Dairy, with nine straight wins and Dick Reed, 210 pounds, the popular Klamath Falls heavyweight. The fight will go six rounds and a knockout is expected.

Another bout bound to please the cash customers is between Leo Hill of Pelican City and Billy Huff of Chiloquin. At the last fight card in Klamath Falls, these boys nearly stole the show and so were re-matched for six rounds here at 155 pounds. Claude Hines, the Ashland colored star, will make his first appearance in the ring, facing Frankie Jones of Tacoma. This is promised to be another good bout. Kid Parker, the pride of the Nash Barber Shop, and Benny Dyson of Klamath Falls, will fight four rounds at 115 pounds. Al McCumber, a brother of Kayo McCumber, will open the show with a four-round bout with Bob Armstrong of Medford.

Admission will be one dollar to the entire house, with the bouts beginning at 8:45.

"It's going to be tough listening to them call me 'Sunny Boy' because I lost that fly ball in the sun during that world series game in Philadelphia," Hack said, "but it's all a part of the racket. I'm training myself to control my temper and laugh it off."

GREENLEAF PLAYS RUDOLPH FOR CUE CROWN AFTER TIE

DETROIT, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Erwin Rudolph and Ralph Greenleaf will play off a tie tonight for the world's pocket billiards championship. Greenleaf defeated Rudolph by 125 to 79 in 19 innings last night. Each has had six victories and one defeat in the tournament.

Greenleaf was the superior to Rudolph under the severe strain. He broke away with a run of 89 in the third inning, but this advantage soon was cut down when Rudolph rallied with 54 in his half. A duel of safety followed with a few scratches thrown in. Rudolph began to feel the strain and three times during the match he missed on easy shots. Greenleaf, on the other hand, was confident and careful. He played with plenty of skill and self assurance.

Rudolph had two chances near the finish, but failed on easy efforts.

OREGON FOOTBALL RETURNED PROFIT

EUGENE, Ore. —(AP) The University of Oregon football season showed a profit of about \$3,800 this season, according to a tentative financial statement of Ronald H. Robnett, assistant graduate manager.

The figures may vary a little because no report has been made of the St. Mary's and Florida games, but since guarantees held away in both cases the estimate is close, Robnett said. Oregon's share in the two games was \$38,000, while team expenses were about \$10,000.

The game with Hawaii at Portland brought in a profit of more than \$1000. Oregon's share for all its games totaled \$87,500 with expenses about \$48,750. The freshman team took a loss of \$3000 including the salaries of coaches and trainers.

KARASICK ON TOP THE UNCONSCIOUS

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Dec. 19.—(AP)—Al Karasick, heavyweight Russian wrestler, was awarded a decision here last night over Harry Demetral, his Greek opponent, under conditions unique in the annals of the mat game.

Each had won a fall and each went after the deciding spill with more deliberation than discretion, with the result that both were knocked cold when they hit the mat.

Karasick was on top, however, so the referee counted Demetral out and awarded the Russian the match. The official's decision was made before either of the contestants recovered consciousness.
