

DEATHENDS FLIGHT OF BRITISHERS

Bodies of Royal Air Force Pair Found in Wreckage of Plane On Side of North African Mountain—Plane Believed to Have Been Buffeted By Storm in Darkness.

TUNIS, Tunis, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Attempt of two British royal air force fliers to fly 6000 miles from England to the far southern tip of Africa ended in death on a north African mountainside, 30 miles southeast of here.

An Arab reported yesterday afternoon he had seen wreckage of an airplane on a slope known as St. Marie D'Azit. Searching parties were sent out immediately but because of the wildness of the terrain did not locate the wreckage until nightfall.

It was identified easily as the Fairey-Napier monoplane in which Squadron Commander Jones-Williams and Flight Lieutenant A. H. Jenkins left Cranwell airdrome at dawn Tuesday, intending to make a non-stop flight to Capetown, South Africa. The late hour and bad weather prevented bringing bodies of the two fliers, which were located in the wreckage, to Tunis immediately, but a detachment of soldiers was left to guard them.

Caught by Storm.
While it was impossible until further investigation to determine exact circumstances of the fatal crash it was believed the two airmen had been buffeted severely by a storm which raged in this section of the Mediterranean Tuesday night. It was supposed they lost their way in the darkness, and dashed against the mountainside when they sought a landing.

Search continues for another airplane, piloted by the Frenchmen, Lasalle, Rebard and Faltot, which is missing in this vicinity. It arrived here Sunday en route from Le Bourget to Saigon, Indo-China. It took off again at 8:45 p. m. for Bengasi. Nothing has been heard of it since. Ships searched the Gulf of Gabes for a trace.

McKENZIE HIGHWAY IS CLOSED BY BIG DRIFTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 19.—(AP)—The Oregon State Motor association said today McKenzie highway, from Bend to Eugene, is closed. Heavy drifts of snow have effectively barricaded the highway. A state highway truck attempted to get through a day or so ago, the motor association said, but was unable to make headway.

SUGGESTIONS IN OUTDOOR LIGHT CONTEST GIVEN

Committee Outlines Dozen Ways to Participate in Christmas Display of Globes About House.

Interest in Medford's second annual outdoor Christmas lighting contest is growing day by day and many local citizens are planning to install attractive displays on or before Dec. 22nd.

Rainy weather has delayed the installation of several residence exhibits but preparations are being made to get these in place before the end of the week.

Judging of the displays is scheduled to take place during the period from Dec. 25 to Jan. 2nd.

For the benefit of those who are as yet undecided how to proceed with their Christmas lighting decorations the following suggestions have been made by the committee in charge of this year's activity:

1. Substitute a red lamp for the customary one in your entrance fixture and put a wreath around it.
2. Place electric candles in Christmas wreaths in your windows. (Electric candles are far safer than the wax variety.)
3. Run colored lights thru the trees and shrubbery on your grounds.
4. Place Christmas trees in tubs in the yard and trim them with strings of colored lights.
5. Run strings of colored lights along your veranda.
6. Festoon strings of colored lights along the eaves of your house.
7. Place colored lights in your flower boxes.
8. Twine colored lights in wreaths or garlands and hang them in the windows or festoon them about the outside of the house.

9. Place illuminated stars over the doors or on the roof of your house.

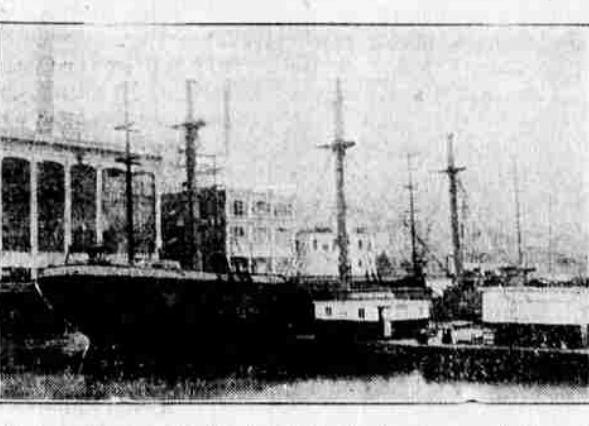
10. Illuminate your Christmas trees, both those used indoors and those in the yard, with strings of tiny electric lights.

11. Place colored lights, one red and one green, in twin sockets and place them in the windows.

12. Hang illuminated Christmas bells in the entry or in the windows.

There are many other effective ways in which to spread the glad spirit of the Christmas season through outdoor lighting and it is expected that some clever displays will result from the efforts of this season's contest.

Old Convict Ships Aids Seattle During Shortage of Electricity



How an old ex-convict ship helped keep the electric lights burning in thousands of Washington homes was revealed in Seattle the other day when public attention was focused on the Lake Union steam plant of the city light department, which has been supplying nearly 80 per cent of the power in the recent crisis.

The story runs something like this: Nearly a hundred years ago the Lady Gainsborough was the pride of the British shipping between Liverpool and Calcutta. Swift, trim, the ship was one of the fastest on the seven seas. Later, when the days of her glory had begun to dim, the Lady Gainsborough became a convict ship.

Finally she was wrecked on the island of Oahu, in the Hawaiian group, where it was salvaged, renamed the Diamond Head, and converted into a tanker for the present owners, the General Petroleum corporation.

It is a far cry from a Calcutta passage to a berth in Lake Union, but many years ago, when General Petroleum first began to supply the Seattle steam plant with fuel oil, the Diamond Head was brought to the city for a storage "tank."

Although it will sail the seven seas no more, the Diamond Head, alias the Lady Gainsborough, will probably continue for years to come to be one of the most valuable of the old-time vessels afloat.
