Many Spurious Century Notes in Circulation

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Chance carefully at your change—there's a lot of counterfeit \$100 bills about. Allen G. Straight, head of the secret service in New York, has revealed that a number of spurious notes of new Federal Reserve \$100 denomination are being circulated throughout the country, especially in cities along the Atlantic and Pacific coasts. The bills are nearly perfect in engraving and experts can detect them only with the aid of powerful magnifying glasses. The green ink is too dark in spots and the picture of Benjamin Franklin on the face is made from too fine a screen among other flaws.
