The Dorcas society of the Seventh Day Adventist church here has many articles of hand-made fancy work for sale for Christmas gifts at the Basket Grocery.

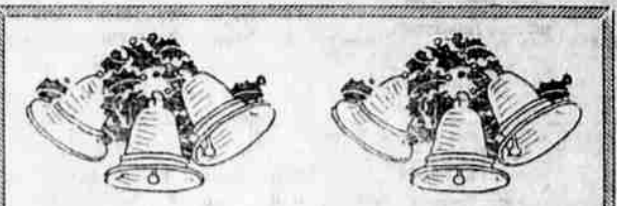

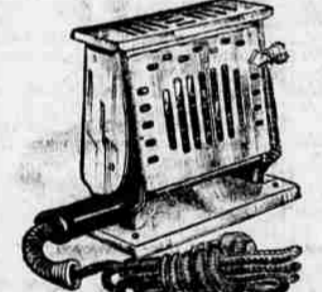

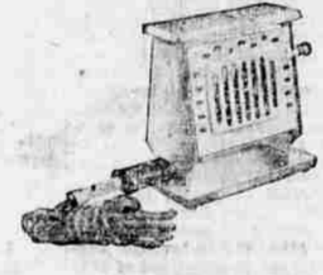
