MATINEE FREE TO KIDS ON SATURDAY

Fulfilling the promise made on the recent visit to Medford on the occasion of the Christmas opening, Santa Claus will again visit the children of Medford and surrounding country tomorrow, when he will offer a free Christmas Matinee to all children at the Craterian and Rialto theaters. The pre-Christmas shows are made possible through the co-operation of the Fox Theaters corporation and the retail trade department of the chamber of commerce. Manager Mendenhall, of the Fox theaters, has arranged special Christmas pictures to be shown at both theaters, and Santa Claus will make a personal appearance and talk to the children. The films to be shown will be "Alice Through the Looking Glass," and "Play Safe." The shows will start promptly at 10:30 a. m., and the doors of the Fox playhouses will open at 10:00 a. m. There will be no charge for admission, and all of the children of Medford are cordially invited to be the guests of Santa Claus and the Fox theaters.

It was announced, previous to the first visit of the Christmas saint, that his first trip was one of investigation, and that, if he found the children of Medford so desirous, he would make this return trip on December 21. Parents are reminded that the Christmas matinee will give an opportunity to safely dispose of the children for a period of two hours, in which last-minute shopping can be done. The show will last until noon and parents can meet their children as they come out of the theaters.

TEACHERS' ASSN. MEETS THURSDAY

Teachers all over the state will be breaking away from Christmas day festivities next Wednesday in order to reach the opening business session of the state association meeting in Portland, which is slated for 9 o'clock Thursday morning.

Full quotas of delegates from every county, together with committee members, officers, those on programs of the 20 different departments, and teachers who attend will all be en route to Portland by Christmas night, unless they live but short distance from the metropolis.

The two star speakers on the program this year are Dr. John Cayce Morrison, assistant commissioner for elementary education, state of New York, and Dr. George Willard Fraser, president of the State Teachers' college, Greeley, Colo.

The study being made has as its ultimate purpose such a revision of the school revenue laws as will provide an equitable and adequate system of financial support for the public schools of the state.
