TUCKER SNOW RIG IN HARD TEST ON RUN TO LAKE RIM

As the result of three years constant experimenting and construction of working models, E. M. Tucker of this city yesterday gave his snow sled its first successful test by running over the snow to the rim of Crater Lake with four passengers. The sled operated perfectly and made an average speed of seven miles an hour from a point four miles this side of Anna Springs where snow began to be sufficiently deep for its use.

In telling of its test Mr. Tucker was confident today he had evolved a successful machine and plans to repeat the performance tomorrow in going back to the lake if the weather is favorable, making the second time a motor-driven sled has ever been to the rim this time of the year.

Using a 25-horsepower motor, the sled found little trouble in negotiating the hill climbs and going over four or five logs that were in the road. There was no trouble on the trip with the exception of a big snowdrift near the rim, where the sled turned over but was not seriously damaged. On the return trip it made an average of 12 miles an hour.

Mr. Tucker declared the sled is capable of pulling big loads over the snow with several smaller sleds trailing behind. He is ready to demonstrate the machine any time to interested parties.
