SANTA CLARA IS BEATEN BY O.S.C. IN FAST BATTLE

SANTA CLARA, Dec. 21.—(AP) Oregon State college showed a revival of form in their third basketball game in this section of California by defeating the Santa Clara university quintet, 26 to 20, at Dreamland auditorium here tonight.

After losing to the Olympic club and the Young Men's Institute earlier in the week, the Oregon States displayed a much superior brand of basketball against the Bronchos tonight. Ballard, Oregon forward, was high point man of the game scoring six field goals and a free throw. Callahan, forward, also played good ball getting two field goals and two free throws.

Santa Clara had trouble getting started but finally found themselves in the second half, too late, however, to overcome Oregon's lead. Gough, forward, gathered in twelve points and Niles, forward, seven for the Bronchos.

SHIRES SCHEDULED FOR ST. PAUL BOUT

ST. PAUL, Minn., Dec. 21.—(AP) Arthur J. (The Great) Shires, manager, tamer and fighting bull player of the Chicago White Sox, has been signed for a ten-round bout here January 7. Promoter Jerk Doran announced tonight.

The "great one's" opponent has not been selected, but he will be chosen more for color than for class, Doran said. Preferably an athlete who has won a name in some other sport than boxing and who stands about even with Arthur in ring experience.

Doran said he would consider challenges from football players, hockey players, umpires or other baseball players. The bout will headline a card made up entirely of heavyweight matches.

WHITE PROMOTED TO MAJOR GENERAL NORTHWEST AREA

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 21.—(AP) Promotion of Brigadier-General George A. White of Oregon to the rank of major-general, and assignment to command the 43rd division, was provided in recent war department orders, it became known today. General White's assignment and promotion have been pending since last October, but no announcement was made until the preliminary procedures had been completed officially.

The 43rd division comprises national guard troops in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming. A group of northwestern governors joined with Governor I. L. Patterson of Oregon in recommending General White's selection for the post, and the promotion to major general was recommended by the commanding general of the 9th corps area at San Francisco, Major-General John L. Hines, former chief of staff of the army, and by Major-General William G. Everson, National Guard chief in the war department.

General White is a World War veteran and a graduate of the command and general staff school at Fort Leavenworth and the army war college here. He is one of the few men under 30 to receive the rank of major general.

Headquarters of the division are placed at Portland.

CORVALLIS PAPER PICKS CALLISON FOR COACH JOB

"Orange Peelin'", a sport column published in the Corvallis Gazette-Times, remarks as follows on the coaching situation at Oregon, and picks Prink Callison as the choice for the job by the University "powers that be".

The executive committee at the University of Oregon has finally made public the real sentiment at Eugene relative to the coaching situation at the university. With the announcement that McEwan will be asked to resign and not complete the 1930 season with the Weibfest, the long newspaper campaign has come to an end relative to what the captain was going to do or what the real feeling was of the university officials.

Now that McEwan will not be at the university any more the next question is who will be the chief mogul down at Eugene on the football coaching staff. Prink Callison, former Medford high school coach and football star at the university, was freshman coach at Eugene this year. Callison was brought to Eugene at a smaller salary than that which he received at Medford in 1928.

NEBRASKA TRUST BANK FAILS AND ARRESTS FOLLOW

OMAHA, Dec. 21.—(AP) Assistant Attorney General Irvin Stalmaster of Nebraska announced tonight that additional charges will be filed Monday or Tuesday against Ralph E. Smith and Paul E. Armstrong, vice presidents of the insolvent Peters Trust company of Omaha, who were released from jail late today under bond of \$4,000 each pending trial in district court on charges of embezzling \$1,464,844.

Smith and Armstrong entered pleas of not guilty when arraigned today. Deputy County Attorney Jack Marer, one of the prosecutors, told Police Judge Lester Palmer at the arraignment that the examination of the trust company's books thus far indicated irregularities of approximately \$1,000,000.

GOLDEN, MELHORN PASADENA PLAY

PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 21.—(AP) Two golf exponents from the Atlantic seaboard, Johnny Golden and Bill Melhorn, today stroked their way to the lead of a field of more than one hundred players in the Pasadena \$4,000 open tournament, putting 25 holes of qualifying play behind them with cards of 140.

Within a stroke of this pair trooped a quintet of link performers tied for second place. Among them was George Van Elm, Detroit amateur, who yesterday headed the list with his fellow townsman, Walter Hagen.

Along with Van Elm came Craig Wood, defending titleholder from Bloomfield, N. J.; Horton Smith, Joplin, Mo.; Joe Kirkwood, the trick shot artist from Philadelphia and Denmore Shute, Columbus, Ohio, all with scores of 141. Golden, who hails from Patterson, N. J., shot a 47 on today's eighteen, one over the course record held by Wood, and four under par figures. This was by a stroke the best card of the proceedings. "Wild Bill" Melhorn, New York professional and Kirkwood, had 68's for the next best count.

On the basis of scores of 131 or better, sixty-four qualified to compete for the money in tomorrow's concluding 36 holes. Outside of the pair of the select group stood Clarence Clark, Tulsa, Okla., professional who won the San Gabriel amateur-professional event a few days ago, and Tommy Armour, of Detroit. All the other favorites survived.

Johnny Farrell, New York, runner-up in the Professional Golfers' association championship, shot a sub-par 79 to keep in the running with a 142, with six others a stroke behind.
