MOEN PROMOTED IN PARK SERVICE

It will be with much regret that their many Medford friends and acquaintances learn that Mr. and Mrs. Arthur T. Moen and children are going to leave Medford, and on Saturday will depart for Yosemite National Park in California, to which vacation Mr. Moen has been transferred to duty from Crater National park. Mr. Moen has sold his home at 115 North Peach street.

Mr. Moen only recently received notice of his appointment as property custodian of Yosemite park, effective January 1st, a very responsible position and a well deserved promotion, where he again will work under his former chief, Colonel C. G. Thomson, who is superintendent of Yosemite park.

Mr. Moen was appointed to Crater National park service from the civil service register at Seattle in March, 1923, to relieve Harry Long who was transferred to the forest service. About a year later he was appointed special disbursing agent for the park and in this capacity has collected and disbursed since then approximately a million dollars of government funds through the local park office. LONDON, Dec. 25.—(AP)—Mrs. Olive Locker-Lampson, American wife of Commander Oliver Locker-Lampson, British M. P., died yesterday. She was formerly Bianca Jacqueline Paget of Pasadena, Cal.

She was taken ill Sunday night and was removed to a private clinic, where doctors operated on her in a vain effort to save her life.

Mrs. Locker-Lampson was considered a very beautiful woman, and her portrait was widely commented on at the royal academy exhibition. She was married to the commander in 1923.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 25.—(AP)—William H. Fry, artist and noted wood carver, died at his home here today. He would have been 100 years old next February. He learned the wood carving trade from his father who was the best known wood carver in Bath, England, during the reign of King George III.

WHEELING, W. Va., Dec. 25.—(AP)—Dr. Frank Le Moyne Hupp, 64, a charter member and a member of the first board of governors of the American College of Surgeons and widely known as a cancer surgeon, died here today following a cerebral hemorrhage.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 25.—(AP)—Collin McCree Selph, 63, lawyer, democratic politician, a civic leader and postmaster of St. Louis, died at his home here today. He had been ill more than a year.

ATHENS, Greece, Dec. 25.—(AP)—An Italian seaplane with a crew of five was wrecked today near the Turkish coast in the Aegean sea.

SOVIET SENDS PLANE TO SEEK MISSING PILOTS

MOSCOW, Dec. 25.—(AP)—Personal appeal of Senator Borah of Idaho, chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, and of the United States department of the interior to the Moscow government for aid in search for Carl Eielson and Edg Berland in the icy wastes of Siberia was answered today.

The soviet foreign office announced that an airplane was dispatched Wednesday to search for the two missing American aviators, who failed to return to Alaska six weeks ago from a flight to aid an ice-bound fur ship. They were believed to have been forced down near north cape.

The foreign office announcement said also two other airplanes would be dispatched immediately to aid in search of the missing aviators, one of whom, Eielson was companion of Captain Sir George Hubert Wilkins on his flight across the unexplored north polar area last year.

SEWARD, Alaska, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Arrival yesterday of three powerful cabin type planes with a complement of experienced Canadian fliers to man them, revived the fading hope of the northland that the search for Pilot Carl Ben Eielson and Mechanic Edg Berland, missing in Siberia since November 8, might prove successful.

The planes and fliers, brought here from Seattle on the coast guard cutter Chelander were speedily transferred to a train on the Alaskan railroad and were proceeding today to Fairbanks, where they were to be reassembled and flown either to Nome or Teller, Alaska, to engage in the search.

Although Alaskan pilots have been making strenuous efforts to find Eielson and Berland, they have been handicapped by lack of proper equipment.

PENDLETON, Ore.—(AP)—A new hybrid wheat variety that has the high yielding characteristics of federation, enough hardness to make it safe for fall planting, is being developed at the state college experimental station and is being tried on a larger scale in this county. This wheat, a cross between Federation and Fortyfold, outyielded all other winter varieties on the new Pendleton branch grain expert station this season.

BANK CASHIER SLAIN IN FIGHT WITH BANDITS

SMITH'S GROVE, Ky., Dec. 25.—(AP)—Robert Kirby, cashier of a local bank, was killed today in a fight with a band of robbers who had held up and robbed the bank of Oakland, Ky.

The robbers abandoned their automobile and fled to the hills north of town, where some 200 or 300 citizens, led by officers went in search of them.

LATE YULE MAIL STILL ARRIVING AT POST OFFICE

Although every parcel of Christmas and letter mail that had arrived in the city by late Tuesday afternoon had been delivered by 7:30 Tuesday evening, Christmas eve, another illustration of the greatest Christmas this city ever enjoyed, as shown in the record-breaking number of Christmas parcels, both received and sent out, was the arrival late Tuesday night and yesterday of 100 sacks of belated Christmas parcels and Christmas letter mail, which was mailed by the senders too late to reach Medford in time for delivery before Christmas day, and more Christmas mail packages and letters arrived this forenoon.

All this belated mail was delivered today by the postoffice trucks and delivery crews that functioned during the Christmas rush period. The tabulation of receipts during the Christmas sending period will not be made until the end of this month when it will be included in the regular monthly and quarterly reports. It is known, however, that up to Tuesday noon the financial receipts from the sale of stamps, etc., during the Christmas sending season was \$1000 greater than during any similar period in Medford's history.

24 LIVES LOST IN HEAVY GALE OVER G. BRITAIN

LONDON, Dec. 25.—(AP)—Heavy seas running today from the Orkney islands to Spain endangered shipping and brought recurrence of the hazardous conditions of 19 days ago. At least 24 were believed dead in the holiday gale which swept the British Isles and adjoining waters.

The sun shone over southern England and there was every appearance of a spring day, but ships put in to Plymouth, ample testimony of the fear of lashing by wind and sea.

A Norwegian ship, the Astaug, of 585 tons register, sank with all on board off Farallones, Spain, Wednesday. The ship Panjon later wirelessly Vigo, Spain. It had recovered 11 bodies of the crew of 24 but could not identify them.

The Wick wireless station received a message from the traveling Embassy that 10 men had been rescued from the Norwegian motorship Junior, which was sinking in the North Sea.

Lloyd's reported numerous steamships in difficulties with propeller or rudder trouble, but the Norwegian craft was the only instance where loss of life was reported. The wind measured 70 miles off the Orkneys. The masts were held up at Kirkwall and the North Orkneys were without Christmas letters.

Greiner at the time of his passing, was a successful operator of laundry routes in Detroit. He was formerly connected with the Gleason Foundry company of Portland and was acquainted in this city.

Greiner was killed by a trolley when it is presumed he resisted an attempted holdup, and was shot and killed.
