

WEATHER SERVICE EXAM TO BE HELD

The young men of Medford and the remainder of southern Oregon who have ambitions to enter the United States weather service will be interested in the announcement just made by the weather bureau that a civil service examination will soon be held in various Oregon cities for the grade of junior observer in that service.

These examinations will be held in the following cities: Medford, Astoria, Baker, Bend, Corvallis, Eugene, Grants Pass, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Marshfield, Pendleton, Portland, The Dalles and Salem.

Applications to take this exam-

ination must be on file not later than January 21st with the U. S. Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Each applicant will be notified on what date and where he shall take the examination.

The entrance salary for junior observer is from \$1440 to \$1740 per annum. Any other preliminary information desired can be obtained from V. J. Hutchison, meteorologist in charge of the Medford weather station.
