## DAIRY CLASS TO START TUESDAY

Smith-Hughes department of Medford high school, under the direction of C. D. Thompson will conduct its second annual night school for the benefit of the farmers of Jackson county.

The subject will be "Dairying." Organization meeting will be held Tuesday evening, January 7th, 1936, at 7 o'clock, in the agricultural room just north of the main high school building. The night of meeting will be decided at the organization meeting. Meetings are free to the public and everyone is invited to attend any or all of these meetings. School will be conducted on the conference plan and all members of the class are expected to take part in discussions.

Some of the topics suggested for consideration are pastures, growing feeds, the silo, feeding, building up the herd, raising calves, selecting a sire, bull associations and other phases of dairying that may come along.
